(Continued).

## Street Repairing and Cleaning.

To relay the principal streets with Macadam or any system of paving, would involve a large outlay. The Municipal Council has not had sufficient funds at its disposal to undertake any large work of this kind. It is however within the personal observation of every citizen that street repairing and cleaning has been very wastefully conducted.

The Committee has not had time to study this problem, and therefore only states the unpleasantly obvious facts, that the streets of the city are in poor condition, and the cleaning of the same very inefficient. The expenditure made last year of filling the streets is considered to have been very beneficial and should be continued.

## Water Supply and Fire Protection.

The forward movement in regard to Water supply, which was begun in 1904, has been steadily continued, and for domestic purposes it may be said that the larger portion of the city is adequately supplied. But for the protection a large expenditure is still necessary.

The amount of property at risk, uncovered by insurance, is estimated at eleven million dollars. It would cost citizens \$110,000 to pay insurance on this amount, and if protection can be obtained at anything less than that sum, it is obviously desirable to procure it.

The data which have been furnished by the City Engineer on this important matter are so largely composed of figures, that it is impossible to do more than state broad facts.

At every fire lately it has been noticed that the water supply is insufficient, and to obtain even the amount that has been available, other portions of the city have been left entirely unprotected.

The valuable business premises on the harbor front require special protection, and the Fire Underwriters and the Board of Trade have urged with all the force at their command that a fire boat for the harbor should be procured. But owing to the divided responsibility of the Government and the City in regard to the Fire Department, it has been impossible to persuade either body to move in the matter.

The waste of water in St. John's is enormous, 160 gallons per head per day is sent into the city. Elsewhere 90 gallons is considered an excessive supply.

The City Engineer estimates that it will cost \$150,000 to make the water supply of the city perfect, from the point of view of fire protection. At the most this would cost the city \$7,500 per annum, as compared to \$110,000 yearly premium, to insure the uncovered property of the citizens.

Inspector General Sullivan, in a valuable report, points out that there is almost an entire lack of fire protection regulations in the city, nor is there any inspection of buildings from this point of view. The danger from inflammable oils on steamship premises is very great, and amendments to both the Inflammable Oils and Customs Acts are necessary. There can be no doubt that vigorous measures are required to protect the city from the danger of another conflagration.

## Taxation.

It will be said, it is all very well to make plans in this extravagant manner, but where is the money to come from? It will be argued that such a programme would mean greatly increased taxation.

The Committee however feel that while careful study is required before a definite statement can be made as to the power of the city to meet such

commitments as are herein suggested, there is no reason to suppose that they are beyond our means, provided an improved organization could be substituted for the present inefficient system. This however is a matter which requires much study, and the need for this investigation constitutes one of the main reasons for the definite recommendation which the Committee proposes to submit to this meeting. In the meantime the question of financing the requisite improvements is one upon which the Committee makes no definite pronouncement in this report, beyond stating that it is hopeful that a solution may be found without increasing the burdens borne by the poorer class of citizens.

A strong committee, consisting of Mr. C. O'N. Conroy, Hon. M. P. Gibbs Messrs. E. M. Jackman, W. R. Howley, and Hon. John Anderson and the Chairman, has been asked to investigate this important subject. It is one which requires particularly careful study and the data for which are not easily obtainable, consequently this Sub-Committee has been unable to make any report.

The following particulars have been obtained from the Municipal Council. The total apportionment for the city is \$97,655, of which the South Side of Water Street furnishes \$28,530.

The total amount of arrears on December 31, 1913, was \$90,655.71. Of this amount \$58,232 was considered good; \$23,343 bad, and \$8,680 doubtful.

A very cursory examination of the present system of taxation on rental reveals the fact that it is very unfairly apportioned, and operates exactly contrary to systems of taxation in vogue elsewhere. The rentals paid on the poorer class of houses are from 1 per cent. to 15 per cent. on the value. The better class houses are appraised at a rental of about 5 per cent. The total taxes amount to 1 1/2 per cent. on that while the former class pays over 1 per cent. in taxes, the latter pays less than 1/2 per cent.

The Committee believes that a method of taxation can be evolved which will easily produce more revenue and be much more fairly distributed. The city debt stands now at 14 million dollars, or say \$45.00 per head of population. The average debt of 42 Canadian cities is \$125.00 per head.

Such are a few of the practical problems now facing the city, but there are many other questions of almost equal importance crying for solution.

That our present system of municipal government is faulty is proved by the present condition of the city. We have been afraid to trust the electorate and their representatives, and have hedged the municipal government about with many restrictions. Our Municipal Act has been an experiment from the beginning. It is so elastic that every forward movement has entailed an amendment to the Act. It is now quite a curiosity in city charters, and in the opinion of the Committee requires to be entirely re-drafted.

The science of municipal government has only recently received the study and attention which it merits. Hundreds upon hundreds of cities are finding themselves in the same position as ourselves, and are busy with re-organization schemes. There are almost as many varieties of city government as there are cities, but one idea seems paramount through them all. It is estimated that nine-tenths of municipal government is administrative, and one-tenth only legislative. The principal aim and object of all city charters is now to obtain efficient

Administration in combination with electoral responsibility. That is what we want also. The source of government is the will of the people taking effect through their elected representatives. But the administration of the laws, the daily supervision which is necessary, cannot be performed by these representatives and must be delegated to expert officials.

The division of these duties and responsibilities between the elected representatives and the permanent officials requires to be most carefully studied, and to be defined in the charter of the city.

It must be obvious to you that such important and such diverse subjects cannot be so thoroughly studied, as to permit of any recommendations being made for changes in the Act during the present session of the Legislature.

It will be think be equally plain to you that it is very greatly to be desired, in order that a correct solution of our difficulties may be found, that practical experience in the working of the Municipal government shall be obtained by those who may be entrusted with the preparation of a new charter.

The Committee has given this matter the most careful consideration and have great confidence in submitting to you the following proposal as the best course to be pursued under the circumstances.

We suggest that the citizens should petition the Legislature to pass an Act deferring the Municipal election for one year, and authorizing the Governor in Council to select and appoint a committee of 10 citizens who shall undertake the government of the city when the present Mayor and Council go out of office. That this committee shall serve without pay for one year and shall prepare a new Municipal Act for the city, by which it may be efficiently governed. The said Act to be approved by a plebiscite vote of the citizens before being submitted to the Legislature in the session of 1915.

I know for a certainty that seals have young but once a year. I have seen seals killed in the Arctic regions in October that were pregnant, and know also that the young are brought forth in March.

The mating season is in July, just when the seals have shed their coats, so that the period of gestation extends over a period of nine months. Sir Edward may accept these statements as absolute fact, which no amount of enquiry will ever disprove.
