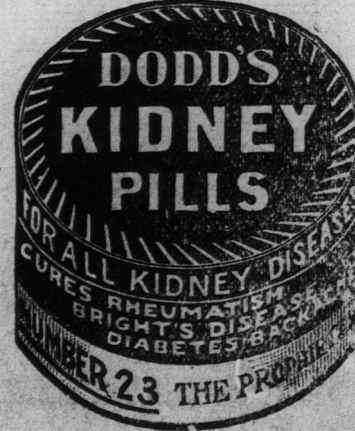

How Local Industries Are Encouraged.

Just before the close of the Legislature, the Minister of Marine in answer to a question of Mr. Lloyd, asking why the Lighthouse Department patronized outside paint factories to the exclusion of local manufacturers stated that the paint bought from the Martin Seaview Company is a special paint, similar to that used on the Lighthouses around the Canadian coast. In reply to a further question as to the intention of the Department regarding next year's supply, the Minister stated that he was unable at that time (May 21st) to say anything regarding the action of his department at such a distant date. The distance of the date which loomed so far off in the mind of the Minister to ordinary mortals was but a month off, as the fiscal year to which reference was made begins on July 1st, and ordered a month ahead would not appear to be an extraordinary course of business. Now that but a fortnight remains to July 1st, it would be interesting to know what decision the Minister has come to. The burden of the reply, however, was the special character of the paint, it would be interesting to learn in what that special character consists, and if any local paint factory has been given a chance to supply the paint of the kind required, and further what kind of paint was used before the supply was obtained from Martin Seaview's, and in what way it was inferior to that now used. Surely, a local factory should be given a chance to supply the paint, if it can fill the bill. Government patronage would mean keeping the work at home, increase the home wage bill, and enable employer and employee to contribute more largely to the general and civic revenue.

Invents New Method of Freezing Fish.

Dr. John Hjort, director of fisheries for Norway, was in Montreal recently and had an interesting talk with D. J. Byrne, president of the Canadian Fisheries association. Dr. Hjort is the inventor of a process for freezing fish by immersion in brine, and it is claimed that the process will freeze fish three times as quickly as the orthodox air system of freezing. A large cod can be frozen in an hour and smaller fish in a lesser rate of time. Fish thus frozen can be sliced with a saw. Dr. Hjort has been loaned to the Canadian Government, and will spend the summer making investigations on the fishing grounds off the Nova Scotia coast and in the Gulf of St. Lawrence—Canadian Fisherman.

LA EST From the Front

9.30 A.M.

CAPTURE GERMAN TRENCHES.

LONDON, To-day. Last week there was no change in the situation. The enemy exploded mines in different parts of our front but none of these caused damage to our trenches and only one caused casualties. Yesterday evening we captured on the German front a line of trenches east of Festubert, a mile front, but failed to hold them during the night against strong counter-attacks. Early this morning in the neighbourhood of Ypres we successfully attacked the enemy's positions north of Hooze, to east of Ypres. We occupied the whole of his first line of trenches on a front of 1,000 yards and also parts of his second line. By noon to-day 157 prisoners passed to the rear. German counter-attacks have been repulsed with heavy losses.

FRENCH GAINS.

PARIS, To-day.—(Official.) In the sector north of Arras, we have gained ground at divers points, notably east of Lorette and south-west and south of Souchez. In the Labyrinth we took 300 prisoners and several machine guns. At Quenneville Farm, after having repulsed several counter-attacks by the enemy, we extended our gain northwest portion on the northern coast of the Somme. The enemy captured and made a hundred prisoners, including two officers. In the Vosges we have realized important progress, two tanks of the Upper Front, the bank more particularly. We have taken possession of Braun Kop. The enemy left in our hands 340 prisoners, not wounded, four officers and a large quantity of material comprising a number of rifles and 500,000 cartridges.

AIR HUNS DEVASTATIONS.

LONDON, To-day. The following official statement, regarding the Zeppelin air raid, was issued last night. Further enquiries show the casualties in connection with the visit of a Zeppelin on the northeast coast on Tuesday night were about sixteen killed and forty injured. It is not possible to state more exactly the casualties resulting from the airship raid. On another portion on the northeast coast on June 6th, the number of deaths there were twenty-four, comprising five men, all civilians, thirteen women and six children, and also forty cases of more or less serious injuries. The principal fires were at a drapery and a furniture yard and a group of small houses.

WASHINGTON, To-day. The published charges that Dr. Anton Meyer Gerhardt, for whom the States arranged a safe conduct with July 1st, and ordered a month ahead would not appear to be an extraordinary course of business. THE LONDON BUDGET.

LONDON, To-day. For the first time for weeks there has been heavy fighting over a comparatively extensive line on the British front in Belgium and France. The Berlin official communication makes a note of it, and describes it as a Anglo-French symposium synchronizing with Russian reverses in Galicia. A win on a mile front, then the loss of it, before terrific German counter attacks, the experience of the British Tuesday night near Festubert. The statement, frank in brief, of Field Marshal French, records this incident, but does not state the losses which must have been heavy to both parties. The Germans are as frank in conceding the loss of the ground near Ypres, but they make no mention of having been forced even temporarily to yield a mile in their Festubert stronghold. In the last Austro-Germans advance continues to swing forward with the exception between the Dnieper and the Zurewop, where the Russians are holding bridge heads and making some headway. The latest Zeppelin raid on England created hardly a ripple of excitement. Air craft protection was one of the subjects discussed in the Commons. William Johnson Hicks urged a marked increase in this branch. He said London must soon expect a serious raid, and added that at one time more than five Zeppelins of the latest type were seen over the English coast. The Under Secretary for War, Tennant, besides giving assistance by bigger aeroplanes under construction, said since the beginning of the war the number of machines had been increased tenfold and the number of men engaged in this branch fivefold.

DESTROYED BY SEA WOLVES.

LONDON, To-day. The Aberdeen trawler Petrel, Explorer and Tappanica were sunk by a German submarine. The Swedish steamer Forsten Gothenburg, for Eng-

land, was captured by a German auxiliary cruiser on the island of Vinz. Twenty-two members of the crew of the steamer Strathairn, torpedoed yesterday, were drowned.

TEIBUNE STORY NOT TRUE.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Secretary Lansing received word late yesterday from sources which are regarded reliable, that the man who sailed for Germany with a safe conduct and carrying messages to the Foreign Office at Berlin from the German Ambassador, was Anton Meyer N. Merhardt.

NO COMPULSION FOR MUNITION WORKERS.

LONDON, To-day. The Government appears to have abandoned at least for the present, any resorting to compulsion in the organization of industries for the production of munitions of war. Lloyd George when he first broached the idea of compulsion in public, was vigorously attacked by Radicals and Laborites, inside and outside Parliament, who strangely opposed compulsion either in recruiting for the army or for industrial purposes, arguing such methods would produce in Britain all the evils seen in the German military system. Lloyd George's conferences with Trade Union leaders resulted in an agreement upon a Bill which will be introduced into the Commons next week and passed without delay. The Bill gives the Government power to prohibit strikes or lockouts, prejudicial to national interest in controlled industries, and provides all questions of wages and employment be settled by a specially appointed tribunal. The Bill contains no provisions for compulsion or even compulsory registration of the male population, but will enable the opening of rolls of volunteers who are prepared to work in any factory controlled by the Government for a period of six months. In all such controlled establishments, producing munitions all restrictive rules and practices of Trades Unions will be suspended and the profit of the employers limited. It was announced to-day in Parliament, on behalf of the Government, that it was intended to impose a special tax on war profits, and that a measure with this object in view was being considered.

OIL TANKER SUNK.

SAN FRANCISCO, To-day. The oil tank steamer, Desaba, under charter by the British Government, was sunk by a German submarine off the coast of North Scotland on Monday, according to a cablegram received to-day by Robert Mitchell, General Petroleum Co.

TURKISH WAR REPORT.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day. The following official statement was issued by the Turkish War Office. Our artillery has caused heavy losses at Ari Burnu; our coast batteries have successfully bombarded the enemy's transports, camps and airship sheds at Seddul Bahr.

MARCONI ENROLLED.

FLORENCE, To-day. Wm. Marconi has asked to be enrolled at a Lieutenant of Engineers and assigned duty with the Telegraph brigade here.

ITALIANS STILL PROGRESSING.

GENEVA, To-day. Despatches received from Lialbush say the Italian Bersaglieri has stormed an Austrian observation post near Bucho in Cadorian Alps and that a strong Austrian detachment defending was either killed or made prisoners. Despatches said that the Italian advance guards have reached Komau. Three lines of railways are declared to have been partially destroyed.

Germans Charged With Conspiracy.

Gustave Stahl, Who Swore he saw guns on the Lusitania, Arrested.

New York, June 10.—A Federal Grand Jury investigation to determine whether there was a conspiracy to "defraud the United States" in connection with the affidavits submitted by the German Embassy to the State Department to prove that there were guns aboard the steamship Lusitania was begun here to-day by the Federal Grand Jury. It is specifically directed against Paul Kenig, also known as Stenler, who, according to the Federal authorities is the head of a secret service department maintained by the Hamburg-American Steamship Line.

The first result of the investigation was the arrest to-day for perjury of Gustave Stahl, a German reservist, who made one of the affidavits submitted by the Embassy and who is alleged to be closely associated with Kenig. The warrant on which he was arrested alleges that he committed perjury in an investigation by the jury against "Paul Kenig, alias Stenler and others," under that section of the Penal Code covering conspiracy to defraud the United States. He was taken into custody immediately upon the conclusion of his testimony, and sent to the Tombs for lack of the \$10,000 bail demanded by the Government.

Stahl, in his affidavit, which was made before a city notary public, swore that he visited the Lusitania on April 23, the day before she sailed, and saw four guns on her deck concealed by leather covers. The repetition of this story, when he was called as a witness in the investigation of Kenig's activities, was the basis of the perjury charge. In addition to the statement by Dudley Field Malone, collector of the port, and by officials of the Cunard Line, that the Lusitania was unarmed, the Government authorities said to-night that they had evidence by which they would prove that Stahl was not on board the Lusitania, either on April 23, or any other day before the departure of the Lusitania on her fatal trip.

For What Crimes Are Soldiers Shot?

There are more than a dozen different offences for which a soldier may be sentenced to death while on active service.

The first on the list of death offences applies to a commanding officer and reads, "Shamefully delivering up a garrison when in command of troops, without due necessity—punishment, death."

A soldier can be shot for throwing away his rifle or sword in the presence of the enemy, for cowardice, or for leaving his commanding officer in order to plunder. If he forces his way past a sentry on active service he may be sentenced to death, or for assaulting anyone bringing up provisions for the troops.

Soldiers are expressly forbidden while on active service to commit any offence against a resident of the country in which he is fighting under pain of death, nor may he break into any house in search of plunder, or discharge his rifle intentionally to create a false alarm on the march. A soldier who acts as a sentry who is found sleeping at his post may be shot. Any man causing or joining in a mutiny is liable to be shot. Desertion or attempt at desertion while on active service is naturally a death offence.—P.W.
