"So likewise, whosoever he be of you, that forsaketh not all that he hath, he cannot be my disciple." That was a tremendous claim for a leader of men to make upon His followers. Yet that was the claim of Jesus, as reported in Luke 13, 33. In that chapter He calls upon His followers to count the cost and estimate the risk of discipleship. Nothing worth having is ever obtained without cost. The successful business man has had to rise early and work late, and sacrifice pleasure and art and literature may be in order to win his wealth. The great teacher has had to burn the midnight oil and study until his brain fairly reels, in order to impart knowledge to others. The great musician has gone through long years of drudgery and discipline before he can execute the music of the masters. The religion is no exception to this rule; if we are to rise to that high spiritual plane where the human soul holds communion with the divine, then we must be prepared for self-denial, meditation, prayer and self-surrender to the will of God, and it will cost something. All great achievement involves risk. Columbus risked all to discover a way to India via the west, and found America. Capt. Scott risked all to explore the South Pole; he succeeded, but lost his life in the attempt. Hawker and Grieve, Alcock and Brown, risked all in their attempt to be first to fly the Atlantic. The world's benefactors have been those who were prepared to take big risks. Buddha is worshipped by nearly three hundred millions of the human race to-day; he was the son of a king and left the royal palace in order to go into solitude and solve the problem of the world's evil. Socrates, who has done so much for the cause of truth in the earth, drank the cup of poison rather than be untrue to his convictions. The Pilgrim Fathers left the Old Country in their little ship and faced the dangers of a wild and savage country for the sake of Religious liberty. Livingstone crossed and recrossed Central Africa and gave his life for the redemption of the Dark Continent. To be a follower of the Christ involves big risks. Of course it means also the curtailment of some of our pleasures, such as dancing and cards and the pictures. Not that these things are wrong in themselves, but they may interfere with loyal discipleship. It may mean the surrender of selfish ambition. When the call came to D. L. Moody to give himself up to preaching, he was earning \$5,000 a year and his ambition was to save a \$100,000; he gave up that ambition to follow Christ. It may mean for you a call to Foreign Service, perhaps to some fever stricken country like West Africa, or to live and work amongst lepers on some South Sea Isle, as Father Damien did; who knows? To follow the Christ means forsaking all, and judged by that standard, how few real Christians there are. And yet, having counted the cost and estimated the risks, will you not yet follow Him? For believe me, you can never give up as much to follow Christ as you would lose by not following him.—Com.

War Veterans' Drive.

**Aviator's Influence
on Newfoundland.**

The marvellous developments of the science of aviation during the past five years bid fair to at last break down the splendid isolation of Newfoundland. St. John's, as an American contemporary remarks, has become the aviation capital of the world. If trans-oceanic air-travel ever becomes a practical reality—and he would be a daring man who would declare that it will not—Newfoundland will naturally become a centre of events, for geographical reasons. Already the insularity in which Newfoundlanders have taken pride, is being broken down. The Legislature of the colony has granted concessions to a company which proposes to conduct mail and passenger services from Newfoundland to Canada and the United States. It is proposed to first establish an aerial service between St. John's and Montreal, and the distance between the two cities will be covered in sixteen hours. At once Newfoundland will be brought into immediate touch with the heart of Canada, and an intimacy between the two British dominions which steam navigation has never been able to effect should result.

It is interesting to note that Newfoundland in the past has chiefly gotten into the newspapers in connection with extraordinary feats of adventure. Whenever there has been an Arctic exploration enterprise under way, Newfoundland has come into it in one way or other. And now trans-Atlantic aviation has put her on the map in a fuller sense than ever. Science of human endeavor ultimately destroy all barriers.—Toronto Saturday Night.

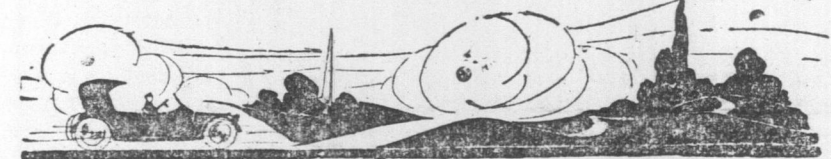

Labor vs. Hysterics.

(From the Toronto Labor Leader.)
At Atlantic City the American Federation of Labor has, with no uncertain voice, declared itself in favor of the craft union as against the Bolshevik—I. W. W.—One-Big-Union. The project to have all contracts so related that the total arrest of all

industry might be instantly accomplished was frowned upon. The convention also bumped the proposal that workers should elect their own foremen. The sane and safe forces in trades unionism showed in the Federation a majority of practically six to one against those who are so violently seeking to hoist aloft the red flag of Bolshevism. These are cheering words for those who seek to gain a

livable life from their work rather than merely to battle with their foes, real or imagined, upon any pretext whatever. President Gompers is today, as he has always been, the leader of firmness in the rights of labor against hysterics, and President Gompers is a safe leader to follow.
