**Civil Re-Establishment Committee.**

Hon. J. M. Kent presided over the regular meeting of the Civil Re-Establishment Committee, which was held at the Militia Dept. at 4 p.m. yesterday, and which lasted until 7:15 p.m., a great deal of important matters being discussed. There were also present H. E. Cowan, Esq., Vice Chairman; Dr. W. W. Blackall, Vocational Officer; Capt. G. G. Byrne, M. C., Secretary; Dr. Levi Curtis, Lieut.-Col. George Carty, Major B. Butler, D.S.O., M.C.; Major W. H. Parsons, Capt. Leo Murphy, Dr. V. P. Burke, Major J. W. March, M.C., and Capt. J. B. O'Reilly. Twenty-five applications for training in motor engineering, garage mechanics, commercial courses and general education were submitted, and 16 granted; while several claims for consideration in the way of completing apprenticeships were also heard and allowed. The employment report showed that 11 positions had been secured for returned veterans since last Friday, and that 38 men were still without work. The matter of securing berths for the sealing fishery is being pushed with interest; 48 applications have been received for tickets, and these are all from men who have made previous trips to the ice, and who are physically fit to do the work. The Vocational Officer reported on 19 men who are being trained in engineering at the Champion Engine Works, and a letter was also read from Mr. Thos. Soper on the same subject. Every satisfaction is being given by the men, and the instructors speak very favorably about the remarkable progress being made by the students. Regret was expressed at the departure of Mr. A. H. Whitman, Principal of the C. R. E. School, who had rendered excellent services since coming to the country. He leaves for Canada by the S.S. Kyle, and resolutions of appreciation of his work was ordered to be endorsed and placed on the minutes. The matter of training men for Civil Engineering was considered, and Mr. G. E. Turner, I.S.O., Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Mines, is endeavouring to meet the wishes of the Committee in this respect. Occupational training for men in hospital was brought up, but deferred, pending a report from the Medical Officer. Several Canadian cases were adjudicated upon, and with the passing of the minutes, pay roll, etc., the meeting closed.

**Another Newfoundland Making Good.**

The Telegram notes from a Rochester (U.S.A.) newspaper that Mr. Jack Lawrence, only son of Mr. James Lawrence, of Lawrence & Co., carriage builders, this city, has received a high promotion in the firm with which he has for some years been connected. Mr. Lawrence was for two and a half years Rochester manager of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co., and his promotion takes him to the city of Akron, where, at the home office of the firm, he will take charge of the sales of two large corporations which have branches over all America. Before leaving Rochester Mr. Lawrence was entertained at a dinner in the Hotel Seneca by the salesmen and staff of the Goodyear branch.

**Western Notes.**

The weather about Channel during January month was very severe, in fact the hardest experienced for a number of years, the thermometer at times recording 13 below zero. Port aux Basques harbor is frozen solidly, people using the ice as a highway to and from the railway station. Much drift ice out of the Gulf can be seen passing daily, and that and the weather seriously hampers cod-fishing, though when skiffs can get out they are richly rewarded. The fish are close in shore and plentiful, frozen squid from St. John's being used for bait.

Up to January 29th there had been no train from St. John's to Port aux Basques for seventeen days, but since then a long delayed express reached the terminus. The Meigle arrived at Port aux Basques from Placentia, via coastwise ports on Thursday, 29th, ult., but because of the bungling of somebody, no St. John's mail was on board, merely intermediate letters picked up en route.

The last Reid Coastal boat to leave Port aux Basques on the South Coast Service was the Meigle on November 5th. Since then not one of the boats of the Reid Newfoundland Company has performed the Placentia-Port aux Basques schedule. This is going backwards to a degree that is disgraceful. Two American vessels are at Port aux Basques waiting for cargoes of herring to come overland from Bay of Islands, and schooner owned by a Lake and Lake, Fortune, is also waiting for a shipment of dry fish to be hauled in from St. George's. All three will not finish loading very quickly at present rate of receiving cargo.

The auxiliary schooner "Luxor," owned by Mr. John P. Chetwynd is fitting out for the winter and spring fishery. Capt. John C. Ford, will take charge of the vessel. Schooner Mahone has landed a quantity of salt at the premises of Mr. Chetwynd, who is buying fish on a larger scale than heretofore.

**Who Wouldn't Be a Milkman?**

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—A few days ago there appeared in your columns a letter signed by "Westerland" concerning the milk in powdered form known as KLIM, in which this writer stated that skimmed milk could be sold to the consumer for 20 cents per gallon.

According to the analysis of cow's milk which appeared in your issue of the evening previous, it contains something over 3 per cent full cream per gallon. I do not know if "Westerland" is a practical farmer or not, but I take it for granted that he is, or he would not have the temerity to write and thus put the milkmen in a false position as regards the value of their chief product.

The point, however, I wish to make is, that according to "Westerland's" computation, he is only getting \$21.62 per gallon for his cream. Incredible! you say. All right then, just watch those figures:—

A gallon of milk weighs approximately 128 ounces. If undiluted, three per cent of this is full cream—or say 4 1/2 ounces. Thus, if "Westerland" sold his skimmed milk for 20 cents per gallon (which he says he can) he would deliver 123 1/2 ounces milk per gallon without cream. His price to the consumer is now 96 cents. The natural inference is therefore, that for 4 1/2 ounces of cream, he is getting 76 cents. Thus, for the privilege (?) of giving their customers three per cent cream in the milk our farmers are charging the consumer at the rate of \$21.62 per gallon for cream.

It is not to be supposed, however, that "Westerland" can go to a customer and receive this amount for a gallon of cream, but according to his own statement, he is receiving from his milk customers just this amount of \$21.62, for supplying 6 per cent cream in his milk. Of course no one could dare suggest profiteering, but after all it appears that the milkman is not the only one who works for nothing.

Where, oh, where, is the newly appointed Commission on the High Cost of Living!!! At this rate of going "Doc" Campbell's model farm should be a profitable source of revenue to the Dominion.

However, to get back to the discussion, I and my family, shall use KLIM without the 3% fat at 55 cents per gallon, rather than pay on the basis of \$21.62 per gallon for the cream
