Three Former Breek Premiers Face Firing Squad

Convicted of Treason, Six High Officials Were Shot

SHOT AS TRAITORS.

ATHENS, Nov. 28. Six former Cabinet officers and army officials, convicted of high treason in connection with the Greek military disaster in Asia Minor, were executed to-day by shooting. They were, former Premiers Gounaris, Protopapadakis and Stratos; also M Theotoris, former War Minister, M. Baltazziz, holder of portfolios in sev-Hadjenstis, Commander of the Greek forces at the time of the Asia Minor military disaster. General Stratos and M. Goudas were sentenced to penal servitude for life. A statement by the court martial, giving the reasons for the death sentences, says in effect that defendants knowingly concealed tawa. Owing to the poverty of many will have to be applied gradually; otherwise it is feared that long established social and economic conditions may be upset. The new regulations provide that no children may be employed in the dangerous occupations of boiler chipping, fire works or glass manufacturing. Children under ten years of age are barred from factories of all kinds, and children under twelve are not permitted to carry coal, building material or debris. Employers are required to keep record of all the child labor engager in their establishments. One holiday every seven days is made compul-
