gave a very interesting address on 'Mental Disease." The functions of the nervous sysem in relation to the organs of the body and their control of the individual in health and disease was explained. The causes of insanity were indicated and treatment from the time of the middle ages was discussed. Within recent years the greatest progress has been made and study and treatemnt of mental diseases have

been progressing along rational lines.

so that mental medicine has kept

pace with general medicine, so much

so that well equipped hospitals dis-

charge 75 per cent. instead of 35 per cent. A comparison was made of our institution with those abroad which reflected very much on the facilities for treatment in the former place. There is no place for the treatment of acute cases. The present accommodation was shown to be 40 years behind the times, poorly ventilated, cold and noisy and without any of the ordinary

equipment for treatment. The work of Doctors Draper and Cotton, of the New York State Hospital, was referred to, showing that a large contributing factor in those predisposed to mental diseases were local infections of which the teeth were the most common. The Board of Works was asked to appoint a dentist but stated that they could not see their way clear to do it and that they could not give authority for the employment when needed.

Physicians and surgeons in St. John's were just as efficient as any seen abroad and could give these cases the opportunity of treatment as similar cases get abroad if they were appointed and had the necessary

equipment. The interest of those in charge was shown by the fact that other then the Minister of Public Works and the Deputy Minister, members of the Board had not visited the institution since the appointment of the present superintendent nor had any members of the Executive.

The influence of Rotarians was requested to get something done to bring to these unfortunates the treatment that they require and that medical science of to-day was shown to be necessary.

MRS. A. H. SEYMOUR.

The many friends and acquaintances of Mrs. Jessie E. Seymour, relict of years Stipendiary Magistrate at Hr. Grace, will learn with profound regret of her demise, which occurred at the Church of England Rectory. Petty Harbor, at midnight Wednesday after a somewhat protracted illness borne with Christian resignation to the Divine Will.

Mrs. Seymour was born in Harbor

Grace 67 years ago, and was the youngest daughter of the late Capt. John Spence, Sr., so well and favorably known, while master and owner of the schooners Sea Slipper and Pembina, which he ran with clock-like regularity, while freighting between St. John's and ports in Conception Bay. On the maternal side she was descended from the late Samuel Bennett, that grand old philanthropist and liberal benefactor of St. Paul's Anglican Church in Harbor Grace as well as in every other good undertaking, and to whose memory a mural tablet was, many years ago, placed on the walls of the historic old Church, as a tribute to his memory. She was a sincere Christian woman, visiting the sick, conforting the sorrowful, and helping those who were in trouble. She was a woman of rare gifts and attainments, but she was loved for her beautiful personality, in which high principle, geneality and warmth of disposition, and charity and benevolence to all, were the outstanding traits. As a wife she was all that the finest attributes imply. Her ready interest and keen appreciation of humor, her never-failing charity, her loyalty to her religious faith will long be remembered by the many friends who mourn her loss. Never was the beauty of her character more fully exemplified than during her last illness.

Of the many brothers and sisters only Mrs. Captain Noble, Mrs. William Mitchell, and Kenneth of Montreal survive-her brothers, Stephen, (a fluent Spanish scholar), Captain John, Eloil, Samuel and Walter, also one sister, Mrs. Charles Lewis, having predeceased her some years ago.
