Havana, Nov. 26.-It is stated on good authority that Gen. Pando has been commissioned by Marshal Blanco, the captain-general, to enter into communication with the insurgent leaders with a view of arranging for Gen. Pando, after a consultation with the captain-general, first brought about the release from confinment of Damian Caballero, who has been imprisoned on the Isle of Pines for some time past. Gen. Pando instructed Ceballero to offer Gen. Rabi, the well-known insurgent leader, high rank in the Spanish army and large sum of money to be distributed among the other insurgent leaders of Cuba, and in addition a large amount of money for himself in the event of the latter succeeding in arranging terms for peace. Besides this Caballero was instructed to inform insurgent leaders that the Spanish authorities undertook honestly to establish the new autonomist regime, if the leaders of the insurgents would accept the propositions made to them. 
