MORE DROWNINGS.

Little Lad's Sad Fate—A Swimmer Loses His Life.
Hawkestone, Ont., Aug. 11.—Philip McLeod, the 10-year-old son of Mr. P. McLeod, general merchant, was drowned here yesterday afternoon. He was playing beside the river, when he fell in.

Toronto, Aug. 11.—Ernest Long, a printer employed by the Methodist Book Room Company, lost his life yesterday afternoon in the lake. He went out canoeing with two companions, Edgar Genereux and Thomas Leask, and in going towards Humber Bay their canoe was capsized, and the occupants were thrown into the water. So fast was the current that the canoe and getting into it, but Long evidently thought that it was not sufficiently large to hold the three, and he attempted to swim to shore. He sank half way, however, and his body has not been recovered.

TRAGEDY FEARED.

H. E. North and His Wife Go Sailing and Have Not Been Heard of Since.
Owen Sound, Aug. 11.—On Wednesday afternoon of last week a gentleman who gave his name as H. E. North, St. Thomas, accompanied by a lady whom he said was his wife, rented a sailboat from Abbey Bros. here, the gentleman stating that he intended to sail up to Warton. Since then no trace of the couple can be found, and the boat is also missing.

The couple arrived here by C. P. R. last Tuesday evening, remaining over night at the Queen's Hotel. On Wednesday morning the gentleman informed the bartender at the hotel that he and his wife had decided to go for a sail in the afternoon, and would probably be absent for a couple of days, camping on some of the islands of the bay. They left the hotel in the afternoon, went to Abbey Bros. boat house, and there hired a sailboat.

Wednesday night was a terrible one on the Georgian Bay, a storm commencing at 6 o'clock and lasting until midnight, and it is feared here that the couple were drowned. At any rate, the gentleman did not appear to be an experienced hand in handling a sailboat, and last night, although inquiry has been made at Warton, White Cloud and Griffiths Islands, no trace of the missing couple has been found. The boat can be found at the Island. The gentleman left an employee's pass of the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway, issued to H. E. North, from Wellington to Hamilton, which is countersigned by G. P. Clarke.

A word unsaid could always be said, but once said it cannot be recalled.

Dying by Dozens.

Terribly Fatal Effects of the Torrid Temperature.

The Death List Growing Larger Every Hour.

Cardinal Vaughan's Brother Prostrate in Chicago—The Mercury Reaches 100 Degrees in Many Places.

Chicago, Aug. 11.—As the blazing sun pushed its way up over Lake Michigan yesterday morning the intensity of the heat was increased hour by hour. To make life still more unbearable a steamy hot wind, as baneful as a stroke from the hands of Sahara, blew over the city from the marshes and swamps beyond the southern limit. It was a blighting wind and men sought to escape from it. It was terrible even on the lake front and in those quarters of Chicago where wealth and plenty abound, the poverty-stricken tenement districts the agony was awful. All night long the miserable wretches sweated and panted in vain for a breath of refreshing air. They slept, tried to sleep, by thousands on the sidewalks and on the paving stones, while the steamy vapors rose from the garbage heaps spreading death and disease. The city ambulance and patrol wagons from the police stations, were kept on the run all night long bearing victims of the heat to the hospitals.

The Very Rev. Prior Vaughan, of London, is lying at the point of death at the Auditorium annex. He was overcome by the heat, and is now in a critical condition. He is a brother of Cardinal Vaughan, of England, and is making the trip around the world for his health.

Cincinnati, Aug. 11.—Thirteen persons were stricken with the heat yesterday. One died. The mercury from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. stood in the nineties. Deaths from excessive heat are reported here, including four colored people.

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 11.—Heat killed two persons here yesterday. St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 11.—Up to midnight the prognostications from heat numbered ten. A number of sunstrokes were reported in East St. Louis during the past two days. Three of them resulted fatally. Considerable suffering is still reported from towns in Southern Illinois. Prostrations were numerous at Mendota, where the mercury reached 100 degrees. One case will be fatal.

At Bloomington there was one death. St. Louis reports 86 degrees, with two deaths.
F. Lange, a farmer, living near Carlisle, died from sunstroke. The 100 mark was reached there.

At Cuba, Ill., James Coleman, employed in the Pittsburg and New Orleans coal trade, died from heat prostration.

Cincinnati, Aug. 11.—The Inquirer's special report as follows: Cattleburg, Ky., mercury, 100; one prostration. Ironton, mercury 99; iron mills shut down for cooler weather. Athens, Ga., George L. Pillsbury, an asylum employee, died of excessive heat. Richmond, Ind., Edna Fulghum died of sunstroke.

Montgomery, W. Va., Aug. 11.—Mrs. John Waters, who weighed 350 pounds, died of excessive heat. The mercury here was 100 near all day.

Brunswick, N. J., Aug. 11.—The heat has killed three people in this city since Saturday night.

Jersey City, N. J., Aug. 11.—Four deaths from the effect of the heat yesterday.

Stapleton, S. I., Aug. 11.—The heat found two victims on Staten Island during the night. There were numerous prostrations.

THE RAILWAYS.

C. P. R. Extension Proposed—Half-Yearly Dividend Declared.
Mr. Thomas Evans has been appointed agent of the C. P. R. Telegraph and Dominion Express Company at Paris in place of George T. Simpson, who has resigned.

At the meeting of the board of directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company Monday the usual half-yearly dividend of 2 per cent on the preference stock was declared, and a dividend of 1 per cent for the half year on the ordinary stock. Although the results of working for the half year have been satisfactory, the directors deemed it prudent to take a conservative course in dealing with the Brantford stock. This would give the C. P. R. a through line from Detroit to the Falls. The original route of the Southern Ontario Pacific was from Woodstock to the Falls, with a spur from Cooksville via Hamilton to the line running over the mountain. Now that the C. P. R. has made a close traffic arrangement, there won't be any necessity for the S. O. P. The building of the line from Brantford to Hamilton would complete the connection. Nothing definite has been done about the matter, but when the C. P. R. officials were here the other day the building of the line was discussed.

TWENTY-SIX FIRES.

Counted by a Conductor on His Run From St. Thomas to Windsor.
Windsor, Aug. 11.—Sunday night's storm did damage estimated at \$75,000 along the Canadian border and in Western Ontario. One of the conductors on the Michigan Central Railway reports having seen 26 fires between St. Thomas and Windsor. Windsor had its share. Two barns were burned south of the driving park. A large fire was noticed about three miles down the railway track east from Walkerville, and one in West Windsor. Nearly all the telephones in the outlying districts have been burned out, and it is impossible to get details. In the immediate vicinity of Walkerville, no less than 25 telephones were burned out by lightning. One of the heaviest losers is Robert Shnel of Sandwich town. He lost his barns and stables, and it was with the greatest difficulty that he saved his house. The whole of this year's crop, so far as it was harvested, was lost, and all the harvest and outbuilding, including the barn, was lost.

The heat proved fatal to Richard Riley, farmer, residing at Tecumseh-road and Mercer street, who was suffering from heart disease. He was 59
