



Cheap Rates Cause Immigrants from America.

Popular Terror of Anarchists Re-

misters went to Windsor Castle on Wednesday, and came back with that handle to their names which is the goal of ambition to the British bourgeoisie. The crowd of "Knights Expectant" was a curiously mixed one, and eminently characteristic of such occasions. It included prosperous brewers, engineers, shoemakers, lawyers, merchants, and, by way of emphasizing the latter day respectablity of the profession of journalism, two newspaper men - Isaac Pitman, inventor of phonographic shorthand, and Wemyss Reid, author and formerly editor of the Leeds Mercury. The Knights Expectant or otherwise are not thought much of by the ancient British aristocracy and court officers and flunkeys, and the crowd on Wednesday had that fact impressed upon them in a variety of ways. Most of them expected that they would travel free in the special train provided for the Ministers summoned to Windsor to attend the council on the same day; but instead of that cheap, comfortable arrangement, they had to buy their own tickets and proceed by an ordinary passenger train. While at Slough they had to submit to the additional indignity of being shunted into a siding to allow the Cabinet special to pass them. At the castle they were taken in hand by the Lords in Waiting and drilled to fit them for the royal presence. Then, after being hustled about from room to room, they had some luuch and there was a little trouble with old Isaac Pitman, who is a vegetarian. Then there was more drilling and hustling, and finally came the processional march along the gloomy corridors into the audience chamber, where the

The final trial was that of getting out of the audience chamber with the least possible delay and without turning the back upon the Queen or knocking the furniture or people over; but all the knights had been well drilled in this at home and while awaiting the audience, and it was performed very creditably. The Sun's informant, an elderly man of considerable weight, declared in conclusion that although the actual ceremony in the audience chamber only lasted about 90 seconds for each knight, it constituted the most trying

The child had set fire to his clothing and the curtains. Johnny rolled the baby along the carpet till the fire was extinguished. He then tore down the burning curtains, receiving severe burns

on his hands and arms. On Wednesday last the boy's companions were wading along the bank of the Thames, when a little fellow got beyond his depth and called for help. Johnny Clinton jumped in and saved him. Then, as the rescued

boy told the coroner: "After Jack pulled me out he slipped back into deep water and we didn't see him again.

The body was recovered a few minutes later, but life was extinct.

The Steamship War. The latest phase of the war in steerage rates in America is the alarm in certain circles here over the announcement that hordes of undesirable immigrants are coming to England from the United States. There is great fear that when the rates go up these persons, as one newspaper expresses it, "will remain stuck in our end of the drainpipe." The nature of the

recent labor news from America prevents any great rush westward. Alarming Developments. Saturday's attempt to plunge an Anarchist dagger into a representative of the President of the French Republic at a state funeral in Paris will renew the popular and official terror in that capital, and make sure the passage of the severe repressive measures pending in Parliament. More striking proof of the defiant attitude of these advocates of assassination is furnished by their bold placarding of the whole city of Paris Friday morning with bloodthirsty threats. The placards were printed on white paper, a color forbidden to all except official notices, and were headed "Conseil Municipal." The police,

therefore, failed to notice their character, till they had been posted for some hours. The manifesto says among other things: "Lovers of liberty: Denounce and threaten the bourgeois organization, which is founded upon theft and brigandage and which, like robbers who are menaced, desperately defends itself. If the defense of the bourgeoisie be banishment and other exasperating measures, ours will be to strike, at all hazard, and to act like wild beasts.

"Bourgeoisie-poison, dagger fire, and dynamite will be your lot. We will give to society its true aspect of slavery." Good Preachers.
