# SUSPENSION OF M. P.'S

Balfour's Motion Warmly Discussed and Carried by British Commons.

London, March 7.—As a result of the recent rowdyism, Mr. A. J. Balfour, the government leader in the House of Commons, yesterday proposed the following amendment to standing order 21: "Provided, that if any member or members acting jointly, who have been suspended under this order as to service in the house, shall refuse to obey the direction of the speaker, the latter shall call attention to the fact, and shall have recourse to force, if necessary, to compel the member or members who have refused to obey his directions. Thereupon, then, without any further question being put, the member or members shall be suspended from service in the house for

the remainder of the session." In anticipation of a lively debate and possibly exciting scenes arising rom the suspension of Irish Nationalsts and Mr. Balfour's punishment proposals, there was a great attendance in the Houes of Commons tolay. The visitors' galleries were filled, many peers and ladies being among those present. A large force of police was in readiness within easy





TO EXPORT DRESSED MEAT. Toronto, March 7 .- Mr. Wm. Harris, forming a company with a million dollars capital to carry on a dressed meat trade with the Eastern Canadian and British markets, has succeeded in interesting the Wm. Davies Company, the largest pork packers in the Dominion, in the venture, and some of the chief meat sales-men in Great Britain. The first big market will be sought in the indus-trial centers around Manchester, where there are seven million people. The initial shipment two weeks ago of 164 head reached Manchester in excellent condition, and 150 more will follow soon. The new movement is attracting very general attention from those who have hitherto shipped to Great Britain on the hoof, as profits have been dwindling of late. The killing of the animals here will provide supplies for tanneries and soap works that have been often compelled to import hides and tallow.

TO RESTORE MANCHURIA.

London, March 7.-The government publishes a dispatch from the British ambassador at St. Petersburg, Sir Charles Stewart Scott, relating to the assurances given Feb. 6 by the Russian minister of foreign affairs, Count Lansdorf, concerning the Manchurian affair. It appears that the Russian minister consented on Feb. 27 to its publication as accurately representing Russia's attiude in the proceedings in Manchuria. The dispatch concludes by repeating Count Lansdorf's assurance that there had been no alterance that there had been no alterance that the statement of the state tion of the former international status of Manchuria, which would be restored when the temporary military measures had ceased, and that everything at Niu Chwang and elsewhere would be replaced in the former position.

FIFTY CHINESE KILLED. Berlin, March 7.-The war office has received the following from Count Von Waldersee, dated Pekin, March "A company of Third East Asiatics, under Capt. Kroerzer, came into contact yesterday southwest of Man Sheng with 400 Chinese regulars, who had apparently been separated from their main body. The Chinese were scattered, and 50 of them killed. Two of their banners were taken. A small detachment was sent from Tien. Tsin to Thsang March 3 to suppress brigandage. Three companies of infantry, a squadron of cavalry and a battery, all under Lieut.-Col. Arnstedt, left for Yung Tsing March 5, with the

BOXERS REVIVING.

He says the foreign commanders have refused a request from the Chinese authorities for permission to send 3,000 Chinese troops to Pekin.




