Dominion Council Decide to Remain in
Hamilton—Officers for the Year.

Hamilton, March 24.—The Dominion Council of Royal Templars of Temperance held a late session Saturday night to conclude its business. It was decided, by a vote of 16 to 16, that the head offices remain in Hamilton, instead of being transferred to Toronto, as proposed, a two-thirds vote being necessary to carry the recommendation. The following officers were elected: Frank Buchanan, Toronto, Dominion councillor; Rev. H. S. Mathews, Davenport, Ont., Dominion vice-councillor; Rev. J. W. Runions, Winnipeg, Dominion chaplain; C. D. Emory, M.D., Hamilton, Dominion secretary; B. E. McKenzie, M.D., Toronto, Dominion medical director; Z. Gallagher, Toronto, Dominion solicitor. A committee was appointed to revise the constitution. It is understood A. M. Featherston will be appointed superintendent of agencies.

Children.

Canandaigua, N. Y., March 24.—A person who was known here for five years as William C. Howard, died suddenly Wednesday night, and an autopsy showed that the supposed man was a woman.

Howard, who was about 50 years of age, and employed as a farm hand, came here five years ago with a woman who was known as Mrs. Howard. Two children were born to the supposed wife.

The dead woman worked for farmers in the neighborhood, and those most intimately acquainted with the family never had the slightest suspicion that she was not a man.

The cause of the woman's death is a mystery. On Wednesday night she took two tablets for a throat affection and was dead in ten minutes. An inquest will be held.

UNDER THE WHITE FLAG

Schalkburger Has Interview
With Kitchener

And Then Goes South, Presumably
To Consult Other Leaders.

The Campaign at a Dead Halt—Tablet
in Memory of South African Heroes
Unveiled at Ottawa.

London, March 24.—Peace is again in the air. Last night west end clubs were greatly excited by the news that Mr. Schalkburger, the Boers' acting president, with Secretary Reitz and Commandants Lucas Meyer and Krogh, had come into the British lines under a flag of truce, and had gone south into the Orange River Colony. This surprising intelligence is generally understood to mean that negotiations on the subject of a possible peace are once more in progress.

Mr. Schalkburger and his companions have, perhaps, gone south with the object of meeting Lord Kitchener, who is believed to be in the field south of the Vaal.

THE DISTURBING QUESTION
Is whether the negotiations between Mr. Schalkburger and Lord Kitchener will deal with a general Boer submission, or will merely affect the immediate following of the leaders. The Boers are of the opinion that General Botha is not taking part in the negotiations affords ground for the view that there is no question of a general surrender. The universal opinion, notwithstanding, is that the prospects of peace are brighter than they have been for many days.

INTERVIEW WITH KITCHENER.
The standard telegram states that Lord Kitchener, after all, is in Pretoria, and the Boer delegates had an interview with him at his headquarters there. They afterwards left for Kromstad, Orange River Colony, from which place the Boers are expected to conduct. Mr. Schalkburger and his companions, it appears, had been stationed at Rhenoster Kop, north of Balmoral, for the past week. The Boer acting president had been, when there, greatly harassed by Colonel Park and other British commanders, and on one occasion he had a narrow escape from being captured. The Boer position being increasingly hopeless, dispatch riders were sent into Balmoral on Friday night, intimating that the delegates would arrive there. Possibly the government will throw some light on the situation in the House of Commons today.

PRESS COMMENTS.
Few of the papers here comment on the news from Pretoria. These take it for granted that Mr. Schalkburger and his companions are on a mission of peace, and again engage in a discussion of possible peace terms, expressing the hope that the overtures will have a successful outcome. The presence of Lucas Meyer is regarded as significant, and is an intimate friend of Louis Botha.

The Daily Chronicle, commenting on the absence of Botha from the deputation, suggests he is standing aside, owing to the failure of his overtures. The paper says that, although the conditions Lord Kitchener then offered to Botha have been annulled, it is highly probable that peace may still be arranged on similar lines, but that the Boers cannot expect more lenient terms.

The Daily News (Liberal) remarks that a settlement would be impossible if the Boers were treated like civilized combatants, "but men do not surrender unconditionally just after taking one of the enemy's generals and four of his guns."

A DEAD HALT.
London, March 24.—Isaac N. Ford cables as follows: "The campaign in Africa is at a dead halt, enveloped in mystery. Prisoners are taken in dwindling squads, and attacks upon the convoys and blockhouse lines are unexplained, and Gen. Delarey's victory is not yet offset by fresh driving operations in the Western Transvaal."

IN MEMORIAM.

Ottawa, March 24.—Lord Minto yesterday unveiled a tablet in St. Bartholomew's Church, erected to the memory of Arthur, Earl of Ava, son of Lord Dufferin, who was mortally wounded at the battle of Hill near Ladysmith, on Feb. 26, 1900. On one side of the tablet is another erected to the memory of three Ottawa boys who fell in South Africa. On the other is a tablet to Lord Ava's aunt, Mrs. Stephenson, a sister of Lady Dufferin, who died on ship board in 1885.

MYSTERIOUS DEATH OF A BRANTFORD MAN

James Quirk, Hotelkeeper and Athlete, Supposed to Have Been Murdered.

Brantford, Ont., March 24.—The dead body of James Quirk, the athlete, and proprietor of the Commercial Hotel, was found at midnight Sunday in the hotel stable. The bellboy heard groans, and informed the cook, who proceeded to the stable, and at the foot of the steps leading to the hay-loft found Quirk lying in a pool of blood. Foul play is suspected, as his head was badly bruised. The culprit (if there was one) is supposed to have escaped through the gate leading to Dalgleish street, as the hostler before retiring bolted the gate, which was found open after the deed was committed. The police are working on the matter.
