THE HOCKEY NEWS OF LONDON

London will have another local hockey league this year. Last night at the Jubilee rink the Juvenile League was organized. Already six teams have entered and it is expected that another will be heard from under and under 15 years of age. The following teams have been received: Hortons, Dufferins, Shamrocks, True Blues, Royals and Waterloo. The officers are as follows: Mr. E. J. MacRobert, honorary president; Mr. McCutcheon, president; Fred Gillies, secretary.

The executive of the Junior City Hockey League met last night. The first matter to come up was the consideration of the application of the Wellingtons for admission to the league. The club was admitted, the membership now including St. John's, Waterloo, H. L. L., L. C. L. and Wellingtons. The resignation of Mr. Nor-

man Woolat, secretary of the league, was received, and Mr. Ernie Phelps was appointed in his place. It was decided to place the figure for protests at \$1. The schedule will be drawn up immediately and two games will be played one night a week.

The St. John's A. C. has unanimously decided to stay in the game for this season. It will have a strong team in the O. H. A., and at a recent meeting it was reported that there were four-teen men from whom to choose a team. Practices will be held at the Princess Rink two nights a week, the first being set for tonight. It has also been decided to enter a team in the junior and senior city leagues.

The Hortons had another good practice at the Jubilee rink last night, which showed that already the players are in fairly good condition.

"JIU JITSU" IS GOOD IN FOOTBALL

Especially Helpful to Linemen—Players Advised to Master the Art.

Philadelphia, Dec. 7.—Jiu jitsu is the sport of the hour at Penn.

The system of self-defense as practiced by the Orientals is very popular among the students.

"Penn beat Harvard because she understood more about the new Japanese," is the remarkable statement of Halfback Reynolds. "My punting improved 50 per cent after I understood the art. My advice to all football players, and especially all kickers, is to master jiu jitsu."

"If Harvard paid more attention to this new Japanese game and less to football proper they would have seen a better finish."

Two Japs have secretly and cunningly taught the Penn players the mysteries of the art. Jiu jitsu is especially valuable to linemen. Penn's light forwards had no trouble bowling over the Crimson giants because, understanding the tricks of the Jap wrestling game, they were able to put that extra little twist in their shoulders which would throw their opponents off their balance.

Takaki and Iwaya, the two Japanese members of the freshmen class, are responsible for introducing jiu jitsu at the university. Although small physically they are able to overcome the heaviest and most skillful student who encounters them in a jiu jitsu bout, besides holding up their end well at most of the other sports. Jiu jitsu has been popular in Japan for 500 years.

To meet in this sport the combatants strip themselves of their clothing and wear a thick canvas robe which reaches to the waist. The men take hold of each other with the left hand by the collar of the robe, and the man with the more alert eye can, by seizing the opponent's other hand twist it in such a manner as to render the arm powerless and throw him to the ground in any manner he wishes. There are a number of other ways of besting an antagonist, among them striking an opponent on the vital nerve center with the upturned hand as temporarily to paralyze him.

Sometimes the wrestlers take hold of each other's hands and the stronger one, by thrusting his knee against the spine, can break his opponent's back or throw him over his shoulder several feet.

Jiu jitsu differs from wrestling in so much as the ordinary methods of catching hold of a man in wrestling is supplanted by a remarkable series of clasp and holds. This wrestling trains the eye so that it can at almost unconsciously foretell the next move of an opponent.

BASEBALL. OFFER FOR CASEY.

Detroit, Dec. 7.—James Casey, formerly of Toronto, has been offered the management of the Providence club in the Eastern League. His intention in the matter is not known.

A NEW HEAVY-WEIGHT WONDER?

His Name Is Jim McDonald—May Be Formidable Opponent for Jeff.

Chicago, Dec. 7.—A new heavy-weight wonder has been discovered here. The new man has weight, but in a gymnasium here made a punching bag of Billy Stiff, and practically put him down in two rounds. Experts who saw the performance say the newcomer is a formidable opponent of the Jeffries.

The new fighter hails from Auburn, Ill., and answers to the name of Jim McDonald. He is 6 feet 2½ inches tall, weighs 260 pounds, is trimly built and handles himself easily. His chief dependence is a straight left, followed by a crashing right hook or swing, which is delivered with coolness and judgment on exposed spots of his opponent's anatomy. CARPETBALL LEAGUE PROVING A SUCCESS

The Canadian, Fraternal Societies' Carpetball League met again on Wednesday evening in the Foresters' Hall, South London, when the Ancient Order of United Workmen team defeated the Canadian Order of Chosen Friends, the score being 35 to 24.

The result of the game was very satisfactory, especially to the Workmen, as the Friends' team had considered themselves almost infallible, their captain, Mr. J. Jarvis, even naming them "The Invincibles." Mr. Wm. Jenkins acted as referee.

That the Canadian Fraternal Societies' League is successfully filling its mission is evidenced by the large crowds who attend its meetings, over 100 spectators witnessing last night's game.

Moreover, a keen interest in the league's proceedings is being taken by other societies, Chelsea Lodge, of the Sons of England, sending a large delegation, which asked for permission to enter a team in the league after the present series expires, on the 27th inst. Mr. Wm. Jarvis, a leading Macrae, expressed his appreciation of the pleasant time he enjoyed through the hospitality of this new

organization of fraternal societies.

Mr. H. Balkwill spoke on the good to be derived from such gatherings. After a prolonged social evening, the meeting was closed, the National Anthem being sung as the members departed.

EIGHT FINISHED IN .300 CLASS

Batting Averages of American Leaguers—Lajoie at Top With Good Margin.

As was predicted before the season was well advanced, Napoleon Lajoie, captain of the Cleveland club, finished at the top of the American League in the matter of batting. Lajoie played in 143 games, faced the pitcher 551 times, made a total of 206 bases, leaving him a percentage of .381. This is 38 points ahead of the second heaviest slugger of the league, Willie Keeler, of the New York Highlanders, who, in 143 games, made a total of 222 bases for a percentage of .355. Only eight men finished in the .300 class, not one of whom belonged to the champion Bostonians. Detroit, Chicago and New York each had one in the top class, Philadelphia had a pair, and Cleveland had three. The eight leaders were: Lajoie and Keeler; Davis (Philadelphia) and Holmes (Chicago), .365; Hoffman (Philadelphia) and Mullen (Detroit), .365; Flick (Cleveland), .360; and Bradley (Cleveland), .350. Stahl (Boston) and Stovall (Cleveland) were three points shy

of the .300 mark. Parent (Boston) had a percentage of .286, and L. Cross (Philadelphia), .280.

Thirty-six players have better than .250 and under .300, 56 have better than .200 and less than .250, and 35 have less than .200.

In club batting Cleveland led with a percentage of .263; New York second, with .258; Boston third, .250; Philadelphia fourth, .248; Chicago fifth, .242; St. Louis sixth, .240; Detroit seventh, .230, and Washington eighth, .225.

AMERICAN SEASON MAY BE SHORTENED

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 7.—When the American League magnates meet in their annual conference at the Auditorium Annex, it is practically a certainty that a schedule calling for 140 games will be recommended. President Johnson, of the league, is in favor of dropping off 14 or more games and it is believed that the majority of the magnates will see it in the same light when the proposition is laid before them. "I believe it would be wise to so shorten the schedule for 140 games," said President Johnson, "and I should not be surprised to see it limited to 140 games and possibly less. I think, as I did last year, that the people who support the game do not want the season to drag from winter to winter. A sharp, concise, hustling race is what the fans want. We adopted the long schedule last season simply because there was nothing else for the clubs to do. The National League refused to abide by its agreement for post-season games, and had we cut it down to our old schedule, we would have had nothing more to do than bite our fingers for a couple of weeks. Proposals to change several rules now

in force are expected to be laid before the magnates, but the code changes will not be made until next spring. The foul strike rule will come up for discussion, but as a number of the magnates have already gone on record as favoring it it will be kept in the code substantially as it has been. The "split" ball will come in for legislation, and there is a possibility that the strike area will be restricted to the space between the batsman's hip and shoulder.

THE RING.

Port Huron, Mich., Dec. 7.—The bout scheduled between Supplies, of Buffalo, and Mike Ward, of Sarnia, has been canceled by Mayor Grey refusing to give his sanction.

FITZGERALD COMING ALONG.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 8.—Otto Sieloff, of Chicago, was knocked out here last night by Willie Fitzgerald, of Brooklyn, in the seventh round of a scheduled ten-round bout. Both men are lightweights.

HOCKEY.

Brantford, Dec. 7.—Billy Taylor and Roy Brown, members of last year's Brantford lacrosse team, left last night for the Canadian Soo, where they will play professional hockey. This winter, Brown played on the Paris intermediate championship team two years ago at coverpoint, and Taylor played forward, both being star men.

THE WHEEL.

New York, Dec. 8.—Vanderstuyft and Stiel and Root and Dorion are still the two leading teams in the six-day bicycle race. At 1 o'clock this morning they had covered 1,288 miles. The positions of the other twelve men still in the race are unchanged. The record for the time covered is 1,421 miles, made by Miller and Waller in 1889.
