The Need of Public Baths.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: I write to thank you for your kindness in publishing my letter re the drowning of a child in the river, and for the fact that it is you and your paper who deserve the credit. It has at any rate started people discussing the ways and means of preventing as much as possible another such accident, but I am mightily afraid that all the talk going on in the press at present will only blow itself out and end just in talk. Ald. Saunders' ideas are simply what I suggested, and for the summer months I think they are the best; but we have about eight months in the year that we cannot bathe in the river or down at the lake, and what are we to do in the colder months of the year? Go back to the old wash tub and a pail of water on Sunday afternoons, as I and I suppose hundreds of others in the city have been doing for years. Of course, I am writing from a workman's point of view. I cannot afford to rent a house with a bath in it, and plenty more of the workmen of the city are in the same box; nor can I afford to give 25 cents for a wash, and if I wish to keep myself clean I must jump into the old reliable wash tub.

I wish with all humility to beg our worthy members and aldermen pardon for even thinking of such a thing as suggesting a bath, but here it is. You can have it. Mr. Mayor and aldermen, free gratis and all for nothing. My suggestion is that you all go down to the Y. M. C. A. I expect the secretary of the association will be glad to help you with a swimming bath. It is as much a necessity as any of our municipal buildings. It is recognized as such by all wide awake and up-to-date municipalities, and as you are the case, London wants one, and in my humble opinion wants one mighty badly. APPENDICITIS LURKS IN DOMESTIC DISH

Cracked Crockery Contains Many Dangerous Bacteria.

Washington, July 20.—Appendicitis lurks in the crevices of the cracked crockery of restaurants and hotels, according to a bacteriological examination made by Dr. George W. Stiles, bacteriological chemist of the department of agriculture.

The examination of cracked cups and plates, selected at random in Washington "quick lunch" emporiums and hotel and other restaurants is the outcome of a crusade being made by the district's health department against unclean eating places in this city. So far eleven arrests of restaurant proprietors have been made, three of them today, for keeping unclean and insanitary places.

Among the germs disclosed by the examination of Dr. Stiles was the "salmonella" which, Dr. Stiles says, "unquestionably belongs to the group of undesirable bacteria, particularly associated with foods in any manner." It is associated with many inflammatory conditions in man, such as appendicitis.

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Many Stirring Sabbath Sermons To Congregations of the City

Words of Wisdom and Advice From the Various Pulpits.

The special continuation services in connection with the opening of the Askin Street Methodist Church were brought to a close yesterday when Rev. Richard Hobbs, of Toronto, preached two excellent sermons. Congregations that completely filled the building were present both morning and evening.

In the morning Mr. Hobbs preached on "The Utility of the Christian Church," taking as his text John xx. 23.

"The mass of people do not understand the utility of the church," said Mr. Hobbs. "Human beings are ever subject to troubles and disappointments in this life. In every walk of human activity there are problems to be found and difficulties to be met. There is no more effective way of meeting them or of way in which so much help can be obtained as by a close study of God's word. People are far too anxious about the things of this life, what they shall eat, what they shall drink, and what they shall wear. All this is legitimate enough, but we do not need to worry about it, for God always makes provision for us for these things. Then, there are mental problems that we all have to solve. From a spiritual standpoint, the church is of the greatest benefit to all, as it leads us to the one who can help us when all other means fail."

Worldliness.
In the evening Mr. Hobbs preached a strong sermon against the worldliness of the present day. People, he said, are becoming engrossed in the pursuit of pleasure, and a mad desire for gain. Get rich quick schemes are flourishing as they never did before, and there never was less religion in the home than there is at the present time. Mr. Hobbs denounced this state of things, and predicted dire results to our national life unless more consideration is given to spiritual things, and to the study of God's word.

During the services songs were rendered by Mrs. E. Wyatt and Mr. Percy Wheeler in a manner that pleased everyone greatly.

AMERICAN TRIBUTE TO BRITISH NAVY

Chicago Paper Says It Should Be the Pride of Every Anglo-Saxon.

Chicago, July 20.—The Sunday Chicago Record-Herald pays the following high tribute to the British navy:

"In the North Sea is gathered this week the greatest fleet the world ever has seen. It numbers 315 ships flying the flag of England. From the admiralty offices in London orders by wireless flash to the fleet commander, and by the same 'lightless couriers of the air' to each station on the coasts of the British islands and to far off Gibraltar orders are carried.

"This is the twentieth century, whose wonder sense is dulled by such a succession of miracles as never in any epoch appealed to the imagination of mankind. Yet the spectacle that is revealed upon the waters where the armada scattered ought to impress even our generation. Three centuries have passed since the tight little ships, which wise John Hawkins had devised and built in the teeth of Elizabeth's parsimony, drove into the heart of the huge force of Spain and levelled its towering pride. From that day Britannia has ruled the wave and ruled it of right and might. Holland in her great age challenged her rule, and France. But their challenges were vain. Now Germany is straining every resource in the dream of seizing the scepter of the seas from her hand.

"It will be long before that comes. It may never come. Certainly the British navy today shows no sign of decay. On the contrary, it is impressive not merely because of its overwhelming size but also and perhaps chiefly because of the shining efficiency which we seldom associate with bulk.

The use of wireless communication is but a detail of this efficiency, but it is typical of the genius which in Sir John Hawkins created a new naval ship and laid the foundation of the great fleets of the age of oak. It is a sign that the British navy is up to date in every detail, the pride of the Briton and of every man in whose veins runs Anglo-Saxon blood."

WHY NIAGARA BOATS FLY AMERICAN FLAG

Required by International Law—Get More Business.

Toronto, July 20.—Comment has often been aroused by the action of the Niagara Navigation Company in raising a large American flag at the bow of the Cayuga when she enters the harbor. She flies a Canadian flag at her stern, but the flag hoisted at the bow is larger in size, and many loyal Canadians think that the company's desire to please our American visitors carries them too far.

When seen by a reporter, says the Star, the agent in charge of the company's office at the wharf laughed at the suggestion of disloyalty.

"Very few people know," said he, "that it is an international law that vessels entering any foreign port shall fly the ensign of that country at the bow. As we ply between Toronto and Lewiston, we fly the Canadian flag at the stern, which is the place of honor, and the American flag at the bow. It is a matter of international courtesy, so to speak."

"But isn't that American flag a little large compared with the Canadian colors?" asked the reporter.

The official laughed. "You must not forget that we draw a very great part of our patronage from the Americans," he replied. "We carry more excursions from this side, but some of our best passengers come from across the line."

The charge that the American flag is hoisted when the vessels enter Toronto harbor was denied, and the statement made that the flags are carried all the time.
