SPLENDID PERFORMANCE

SIMCOE ROLLER RINK
Vernon Roller Skates—Large Audience Last Evening.

The engagement is for Friday and Saturday evenings and Saturday matinee, with the band in attendance on each occasion.
Tonight's performance will include fancy skating upon stilts, and a complete change of the handsome costumes worn by Mr. Vernon.

THOMAS FIELDS IS CHARGED WITH THEFT

Taken Into Custody at Crumlin Yesterday—Case Was Adjourned.

Osborne, of this city, and also of stealing an overcoat, a pair of shoes and a pair of gloves from David MacArthur of the Hotel Cecil. Field was missing, too, and it was not until yesterday that he was located at Crumlin. It is alleged that he went into the stable of the Windsor Hotel and took the set of harness off Mr. Osborne's horse, as it stood.

One of the members present last evening intimated that the slate will be somewhat similar to that of the joint committee of the R. E. O. A. and Board of Trade, in that no members of the city council will be on it.
