CALL A BARONET'S WIFE A SMUGGLER
United States Officials Raid Lady Duff Gordon's Dress Shop in New York.

New York, May 26.—"Lucella, Limited," a corporation, dressmaking concern, established here in January, 1910, in West Thirty-sixth street, by Lady Duff Gordon, wife of Sir Cosmo Edmund Duff Gordon, as a branch of Lady Gordon's main store in London, England, was raided yesterday afternoon by Deputy Surveyor Norwood and Customs Inspector Williams, Thomas J. Duggan, the manager, was placed under arrest by Deputy United States Marshal Reed.

Duggan's arrest was made on a warrant issued by Commissioner Shields, charging the accused man with conspiring with Abraham Merritt, the secretary, "unlawfully, knowingly and corruptly" to import women's wearing apparel from England at less than their true value. According to the complaint the conspiracy was formed Dec. 16, 1910, but Assistant United States Attorney Wemple says undervaluations have been going on ever since the store was opened.

Wemple said the undervaluations amounted to at least 50 per cent of the value of the imported goods.

A subpoena will be issued for Lady Duff Gordon's appearance as a witness before the federal grand jury. Lady Gordon is a daughter of Douglas Sutherland, of London, and was the widow of James S. Wallace when she married in March, 1900, Sir Cosmo Edmund Duff Gordon, the fifth baronet of that name.

FEARS BUSINESS WILL BE INJURED
Justice Harlan Returns to His Attack on Recent Standard Oil Decision.

Washington, May 26.—Still as opposed to the majority opinion of the supreme court of the United States in the Standard Oil case as he was on the day that opinion was announced, Associate Justice Harlan today filed in court his formal dissenting opinion in that suit.

His oral attack on the court for holding that only unreasonable or undue restraints on trade are in violation of the law furnished the outline for today's broadside against the opinion. He went further, however, and criticised the court for modifying the decree of the lower court so as to permit the subsidiary companies to enter into agreements among themselves, and expressed a conviction that instead of the opinion giving quiet and rest to the business of the country, it would throw business into confusion and invite widely extended and harassing litigation, the injurious effect of which will be felt for many years.

Ever since the case was decided, May 15, Justice Harlan has been preparing his dissenting opinion and it was not complete until today. One of the last changes made, it is said, was to insert a quotation from the decision of Judge Taft, now President Taft, in the Addystone pipe case, in which Judge Taft said, that according to the decision of the supreme court, all restraint, whether reasonable or unreasonable under the common law, were forbidden by the statute.

MANY ACTIONS ENTERED FOR THE COUNTY COURT
One Criminal and Six Civil Cases Are Down for Trial.

A half-dozen civil actions and one criminal case will be on at the county court of the county court, which will be held shortly before Judge Elliott.

W. H. Bartlett, of Petrolia, the driver of the McCreaghs' bus, is on trial for \$250, which he claims is due him as balance for the work done on the McCreaghs' property, under instructions from Oliver Baird, of Parkhill, and J. C. Fountain, of London.

W. J. Hunter & Sons, Toronto, auto dealers, are defendants in a suit brought by A. Knowles, their local representative, for commission on the sale of machines made by other agents in his territory after he had worked up the "prospects."

C. N. Spencer vs. Alf Robinson, and a counter-claim by Mrs. Alf Robinson vs. C. N. Spencer and Sheriff Cameron. The sheriff, under a writ made a seizure of \$300 worth of goods at the Robinson home, which Mrs. Robinson claims did not belong to her husband.
