Chief Justice of the Province.

ACCIDENT RESPONSIBLE

Thrown From Carriage a Year Ago When Returning From Opening of the Legislature.

Toronto, Oct, 12.—Hen. Sir Charles Moss, chief justice of Ontario, and one of the leading citizens of Torondied last night at 8:30 o'clock in his home, at 547 arvis street, as the

result of a general collapse. Although Sir Charles had been ailing for about a year and had but recently returned from England, where ne made a protracted trip to recuperate, his death was not expected. About three days ago he was confined to his bed from extreme weakness, and from that time he gradually failed, until a few hours before his death. His condition then became rapidly worse and all hope was abandoned for his recovery.

Interested in Education.

Sir Charles Moss was deeply rested in education. In 1900 the University of Toronto conferred up-on him the title of LL.D., and the same year elected him vice-chancellor of the university, which office he held for six years. Since 1906 he had been a member of the board of Among the other offices held by Sir Charles were: president of the York Law Association, member of the Dominion statute revision commission of 1901, vice-president of Havergal Ladies' College. In 1894 he unsuccessfully contested the constituency of South Toronto in the Liberal interests during the Provincial general election of that year. Lady Moss, who survives her distinguished husband, is prominently known for her devotion to charitable work. She was a daughter of the late Mr. Justice Sullivan, and was married in 1871. Sir Charles was a member of the Church of England.
