LONDON, June 10.—A resumption of work in the British coal Detective Down. LONDON, June 10.—A resumption of work in the British coal mines Monday, June 20, it is generally assumed here, will result from a decision reached today at a conference of the miners' delegates to take a ballot on the proposals made by the coal mine own-

rers, looking to a settlement of the strike.

This assumption is said to be based less on the idea that the miners regard the latest terms offered by the mine owners as acceptable than on the belief that there will not be a two-thirds majority in favor of a continuance of the strike.

The cessation of work in the mines has lasted for ten weeks, and the funds of the miners are exhausted; and, it is asserted, although the terms the mine owners have proposed do not meet the claims the workers have advanced, they constitute a considerable improvement on anything the mine owners have previously advanced.


