

1878-Trafford's Anniversary-1921

In 1878 the late Wm. Trafford established the business which today is carried on as The Wm. Trafford Furniture Company. The original store was located on King street, within a stone's throw of the market, and there it grew and developed. In 1910 the business was moved to its present location, 129 Dundas street.
