

MINISTER FREED FOR CUTTING CHAIN

Clergymen Barred From Church Fails To Prosecute Charge.

Canadian Press Despatch. Kingston, Aug. 12.—The charge against Rev. D. T. Lancaster, minister of St. John's church, Pittsburgh, of unlawfully entering the church last Sunday morning, when he cut two logging chains which had been placed there Friday night, was dismissed this afternoon by Magistrate Bradshaw, the prosecution failing to appear.

The charge was laid by Rev. W. M. Fee, continuing Presbyterian minister from Pictou, who was advertised to conduct service last Sunday morning, but who was prevented from doing so by an injunction taken out last Saturday by Rev. Mr. Lancaster.

DUNNING IS SILENT ON CABINET POST

Refuses To Say Anything in Regard To Talks With Premier.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Aug. 12.—Premier C. A. Dunning, of Saskatchewan, is still in Ottawa, but has "nothing to say at all" in regard to his conversations with Premier MacKenzie King.

This was Mr. Dunning's answer tonight when asked in regard to the possibility of his entering the dominion cabinet.

SULPHUR IN WATER CAUSED BY WEED

Annoyance To St. Thomas Residents Traced To Milk Products Plant.

Special to The Advertiser. St. Thomas, Aug. 12.—Presence of sulphur in the city water has been discovered to be the cause of the evil taste and smell which has caused so much annoyance this summer. It is due to a small plant called Begonia, which is a sulphur producer. This discovery is the result of exhaustive investigation on the part of City Analyst McLachlin, City Engineer Miller and other officials.

Presence of the weed is found to be caused by wastage from the Canadian Milk Products plant, the milk leaking into the creek, to the extent of about one-half of one per cent. While the presence of the sulphur in the water is in no way harmful, new apparatus will be installed at the milk powder plant to prevent a continuance of the nuisance.

Judgment Reserved.

Judgment was again reserved this morning in the case of Dr. Mothersill of Port Stanley, who appeared a week ago on a charge of selling liquor. Cases of Seydlitz and Lloyd Gillett, convicted of selling liquor to the same men, will also be dealt with next Wednesday.

Mrs. E. Cook, the Toronto lady who was severely injured yesterday afternoon near West Lorne, when a car driven by E. Deighton of Toronto turned over in the ditch, is in a very serious condition at the hospital here. She is suffering from deep cuts in the head and from shock.

Drunk Convictions.

That \$25.25 in connection with a fine for drunkenness was a bit strong, was the opinion of a London young man named Holland, who appeared before Magistrate Maxwell this morning. Another charge of disorderly conduct was withdrawn. It was explained to him that eight Londoners had been summoned to prove his condition. Chief Campbell of Port Stanley stated that the young man had driven his car up and down the board walk creating a great din with a siren.

Case Adjourned.

A charge of stealing telephone poles about July 21, preferred against Alexander Russ, St. Thomas, was this morning adjourned until Friday. A similar charge against another man was dismissed. The second man will be used as a witness against Russ, it is understood.

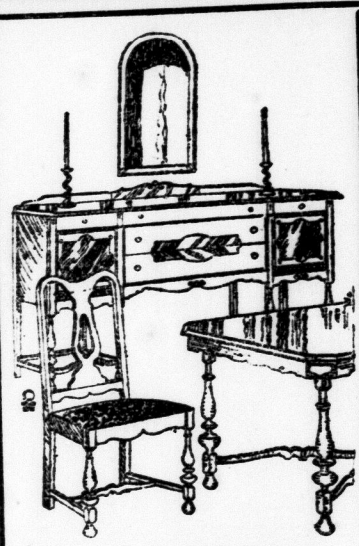
Faces Non-Support Charge.

A sharp bolt on an empty tire-car penetrated her abdomen, and her head was cut, and it was later found a small piece had been broken off the spine.

IMMENSE ENERGY STORED IN ONE FLASH OF LIGHTNING

100 Flashes Are Claimed To Occur Every Second of Time.

Special to The Advertiser. London, Aug. 12.—Scarcely a second passes, year in and year out, winter and summer, when there are not at least 100 lightning flashes somewhere in the world, according to the recently issued Blue Book of the meteorological office of the British government service.

During the year, says the book, the world experiences 16,000,000 thunderstorms, or an average of 44,000 a day. The amount of energy released by these flashes is too stupendous for the human mind to grasp, the book points out.

It is suggested by the meteorologists that the water power of the earth, which has already been harnessed, be used as a measure. Figuring on that basis, it is estimated that double that amount is represented by one flash of lightning, consequently in any given second there is released from the clouds more energy than from the world's water-power stations yield in six months.

GERMANY PUTS DUTY OF \$500 ON FORD AUTO

Car Will Sell For \$1,100—Aim To Curtail U. S. Exports.

Berlin, Aug. 12.—The duty on an ordinary Ford automobile imported into Germany will be about \$500 under the new tariff act which was passed without amendment by the Reichstag today. The car will sell in Germany for \$1,100, but even at this price American manufacturers expect a considerable sale.

The new tariff provides for conspicuous higher rates in foodstuffs and various categories of industrial products.

The new duties are intended to curtail U. S. exports to Germany.

ITALIAN FLYER ARRIVES IN NORTHERN QUEENSLAND

Associated Press Despatch. Brisbane, Queensland, Aug. 12.—Commander Depino, Italian aviator, who is attempting a flight from Italy to Japan by way of Australia, flew from Innisfail, where he arrived yesterday, to Cooktown in northern Queensland. The distance is about 175 miles.

Child Unhurt Though Run Over; Police Seek Driver Who Ran Away

Special to The Advertiser. St. Thomas, Aug. 12.—Run over by a motorist who failed to stop, Bernice Clark, five-year-old daughter of Edward Clark, Frome, was picked up from the highway in front of her home about 3 o'clock this afternoon, uninjured.

Thrown to the road, she remained motionless while the car passed over her without touching her. After examination here by Dr. McKenzie she was found to be practically unhurt.

The driver of the car, which bore an Essex license number, will be traced and brought here to face the serious charge of not stopping.

ST. MARYS LOSES LAST OF PIONEERS

Ezekiel Carroll, Aged 72, Was Son of Town's Founders.

Special to The Advertiser. St. Marys, Aug. 12.—With the death of Ezekiel Carroll, aged 72 years, St. Marys loses the last of its early pioneers and builders.

The late Mr. Carroll was born here and resided here all his life. His parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. John Carroll, United Empire Loyalists, came to the spot where St. Marys now stands in 1841, and settled here with the late William Ingersoll. They were the founders of St. Marys and Wilmett, a brother of the deceased, was the first white child born here.

Mr. Carroll was a carpenter by trade and assisted in building some of the oldest buildings here.

A Methodist in religion and in politics a staunch Liberal. For the past four years he had been in ill-health, and death resulted late Tuesday evening.

He is survived by the widow, one daughter, Mrs. John Hayes, St. Marys, and one sister, Mrs. Jos. Brinston, of Kiburton. The funeral will be held from the residence on Thomas street Thursday afternoon, and interment will be made in the St. Marys cemetery.
