

Kingsville Kernels.

Kingsville, June 26.—The funeral of Francis G. Quick, victim of the boiler explosion, took place to-day from the home of his father, Cornelius Quick, Esq. The procession of carriages was about two miles long and an imposing sight. The A. O. U. W., of Kingsville, took charge of the funeral. Bro. Harry White, of the Reporter, was chosen marshal of the day. The procession, headed by M. W. W. A. Grenville and P. M. W. Aif, Allworth, with a fine contingent of brethren from Amherstburg, all in suitable mourning and badges, made a fine appearance. The sermon by Rev. George, of Harrow, assisted by three other clergymen, was most impressive. Dr. Wm. J. Campeau, of Harrow and Kingsville, is doing all that great medical skill can accomplish. The whole community is in sackcloth over this lamentable affair. Peter White cannot live through the night. All others are doing well.

The 85th anniversary of Mr. Joseph Coatsworth's birth was the occasion of a family reunion at his home to-day. This is one of the most esteemed gentlemen of the county, being a magistrate for 33rd year that he has continuously been a returning or deputy returning officer, without a failure each year, either general, provincial or municipal. May he be spared in vigor to 100 years.

The great "Mettawas" Hotel grounds are now a lovely sight at night, since the large number of basket flambeau torches of natural gas have been set aflame. A number of yachts from Cleveland, Toledo, Detroit, Walkerville and Windsor are to bring many to a fine evening's enjoyment on Saturday evening.

The finest crops of hay, wheat, barley and other grains are to-day almost ready for the reaper between this place and Colchester for many years. No brighter prospect has greeted the eye of our farmers. Corn in many fields stands at this time three feet high, remarkable for the time of the year and the late season.

Prostrations and Deaths from the Heat.

Buffalo, June 28.—Despatches received to-day report 20 cases of prostration and two deaths from the heat at Milwaukee; 20 cases and four deaths at Cincinnati. At Chicago the breeze did not appear until the excessive heat had made a record of eight fatal cases of prostration in the city since daylight. The preceding 24 hours marked the culmination of the almost unprecedented period of warmth. According to one authority there were 19 deaths from sunstroke and 117 other cases of heat prostration, fully one dozen of which are pronounced critical.

Carried Out an Old Vow.

New York, June 30.—Wm. Schultz, a veteran of the war, shot himself through the heart early this morning. By so doing he carried out a vow made long since, that when old age and poverty presented themselves life would be no longer worth living for.

AMERICAN WIRELETS.

Michael Sheenan and his wife Nora were drowned in the Lake at Chicago on Sunday while boating.

Ransom Bethune Welsh, D.D., LL.D., professor of theology in the Auburn Theological Seminary, died Sunday at Healing Springs, Va., aged 65.

Early Sunday morning Joe Hopkins and Charles Smith, burglars, were shot by George L. Hicks, residing at 1,101 Ogden avenue, West Superior, Wis. They will probably die.

Despatches from numerous points in Illinois, Iowa and Wisconsin say that all through there was a slight fall in the temperature on Sunday, it was not enough to afford much relief. A great number of prostrations and a number of deaths are reported.

The World's Fair commissioners have selected the following:—Vice-Presidents, Thomas M. Waller, Connecticut; W. H. Young, California; D. B. Penn, Louisville; G. W. Allan, New York, and A. B. The pleadings and evidence in the case of John Stack, who was held for trial for the shooting of Michael Callahan in Odell Finnigan's saloon at Meloni, March 21, terminated before Judge Beach at about 7 p.m. on Friday, at Sailliac Centre, Mich. The jury were immediately closeted and reached a verdict in time to disclose a conviction for manslaughter at 12.30 Saturday morning. Alex. R. Avery, attorney for defense, made a motion that judgment be entered by virtue of a bill of particulars calling for trial in the Supreme Court.

Miss Mary Leonard, residing at 234 West street, Chicago, was fatally shot last night by Joseph Dutton, who lived next door. At midnight Dutton was awakened by his wife, who told him she was endeavoring to get in at the window. Dutton took his revolver and went through the shutters, which were closed. The report from the revolver was heard by the scream of a woman. On going out Dutton found Miss Leonard upon the sidewalk. A doctor said she did not recover. She said she had been blinded by Mr. Dutton's house and was closing them when the shot was fired.

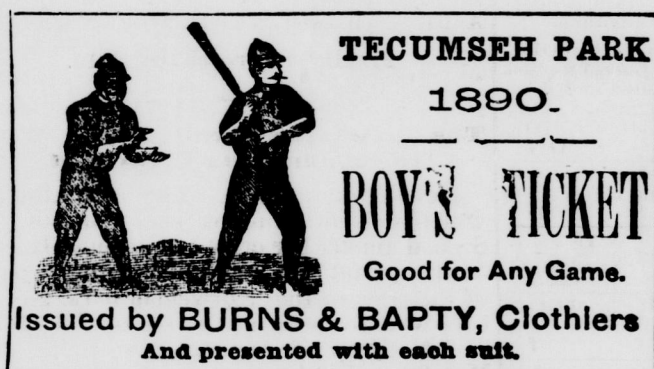
