REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton—Gentlemen: Your Committee to whom are referred all matters relating to the Town, beg to submit the following brief report for the nine months ending Dec. 31st, 1909.

The Town is to be congratulated on the fact that on closing the books on Dec. 31st, there was a cash balance on hand to the credit of the Town of over \$6000.00. This is an exception to the rule. For a number of years past at the close of the fiscal period there has been an overdraft running in the bank, and it is to be hoped that without any further increase in the taxation the fine showing of the past year will be maintained or even surpassed in the coming year.

All departments of the town service are in a much better and more satisfactory financial condition than ever before, owing largely to the application of better business methods in administration, which has been insisted upon in all cases.

During the year a number of heavy extensions

were made in the water system, necessitated by the large number of new houses erected on new streets opened up, as well as the completion of the new 16 inch water main to the point of connection with the 10 inch main on Duncan Hill. Notwithstanding this heavy expenditure it was unnecessary to issue more debentures, all this work being paid for well within the balance on hand from a previous issue.

Considerable attention has been given to the systematizing of the work of the different departments, particularly in the Treasurer's and Clerk's offices, and we feel that the small outlay necessitated will certainly bring about satisfactory results.

ANNUAL REPORT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES COMMITTEE

To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton, Gentlemen—

The Department of Public Charities, of which you appointed the writer Chairman on the resignation of Coun. McDonald, has had a larger number of persons to provide for during the year than heretofore, thus increasing the expenditure of the department. ANNUAL REPORT OF PUBLIC PROPERTY AND STREETS COMMITTEE

To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton: Gentlemen: Your Public Property and Street Committee beg to submit a brief report of the work done under our direction during the nine months ending Dec. 31st, 1909.

Owing to the unfavorable weather conditions the building of concrete sidewalks was impossible until the summer was well advanced, when it was found that the greater part of the appropriation for this department would have to be used in opening up new streets and laying new deal sidewalks on several streets where the old sidewalks had become a menace to the safety of the public. For these reasons no concrete sidewalk was built last year. A load of cement was however, procured, the greater part of which is still on hand for the commencement of the work this summer.

The following new streets were opened up and made:

New street from Aberdeen to Lansdowne. Extension to Prince William St. from East Stanley to the Convent. Cromwell Avenue, from Gerard to Duncan. Duncan St. from Sugar Loaf to J. B. Christopher's.

The following streets were made over and gravelled: East Stanley, with a water course at each end. Gerard St. to Harvey Calder's. Cedar St. to the railway crossing. King St. from Queen to Ramsay. Aberdeen St.

Union Terrace from Mrs. Patterson's to Mrs. Mowat's; also ditch cleaned.

Prince William St. gravelled from King to railway crossing.

A larger amount of deal sidewalk was built last year than usual, in all 2575 feet, as follows:

Water Street, 915 feet. Andrew Street, 852 feet. Union Street, 185 feet. Prince William Street, 295 feet. King Street 328 feet.

Total, 2575 feet.

Six deal crossings were laid, the material for one of them being supplied by private individuals.

Considerable blasting was done at the rock near Chas. Maisey's, with the result that the road is now in a better condition.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FIRE COMMITTEE

To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton, Gentlemen—In reviewing the work of the Fire Department for the nine months ending Dec. 31st, 1909, it is with pleasure and gratitude we report that the Town has not had one serious conflagration. During the entire nine months there were only two or three slight chimney fires, which were promptly extinguished without much assistance from the department; although the alarms were quickly responded to in each case.

The fire company for a number of years past was paid annually by the Town, the Chief of the Brigade receiving \$25.00 and each member \$10.00. Last year this system was discontinued and the brigade re-organized on a strictly volunteer basis, with W. J. Christie as Chief, the company consisting of 15 members. Thus the money heretofore used for salaries has been available for improved equipment of

In the summer a room in the Town Council building was fitted up for the Fire Brigade, where they could meet for the discussion of methods of work. The Brigade is indebted to several merchants of the town for donations for furnishing this room, which is greatly appreciated.

The equipment of the department is in a good condition, of which the following is a list, the first seven items being added during the year:

- 1 Set drop harness for hose wagon. 2 Hydrant gate valves. 3 Callahan shut-off nozzles. 4 Hydrant wrenches. 5 Fire Axe. 6 Ropes, Straps, etc. 7 2300 feet hose. 8 Play Pipes. 9 Hydrant Wrenches. 10 Hose Wrenches. 11 Siamese Connections. 12 Hose Mender. 13 Grip Straps for Hose. 14 Fire Axes. 15 Tips for Play Pipes. 16 Roof Ladder. 17 Ground Ladders. 18 Extension Ladder. 19 Hose Sleighs. 20 Hose Reels. 21 Hose Wagon. 22 Ladder Truck. 23 Horse. 24 Steam Fire Engine.

In addition to the above we have also ordered 500 feet of hose, 1 Play Pipe with Callahan Nozzle and 6 Hydrant Gate Valves.

Before closing this report I would like to call the attention of the Council to the matter of the installation of a fire alarm system. This matter has been gone into by this Committee and a report prepared before the Council, which was laid over for future consideration. We would suggest that this matter be taken up by the incoming Council.

QUEBEC HAS A GOOD SURPLUS.

Province About \$400,000 to the Good For the Fiscal Year.

Quebec, April 5.—That a good surplus will be announced by Hon. Mr. MacKinnon, provincial treasurer, in his budget speech today was unofficially stated.

The estimated surplus for the fiscal year ending June 30 next will be in the neighborhood of \$400,000. This is somewhat smaller than last year's, but a large amount of the provincial debt was cleared, the loans of 1878 and 1880 being wiped off the books. This was made possible largely by the receipt of a cheque from the federal government for \$2,000,000 for the North Shore Railway.

The liability of the province will be reduced from \$24,000,000 to \$22,000,000.
