WHAT THE EXPORT COSTS THIS PROVINCE

Pulpwood Exported Annually Would Keep Twenty-Four Mills at Work.

The Forestry branch of the Federal Department of the Interior has issued a little pamphlet on the pulp wood situation during the years 1909 and 1910—that is before the more rigidly restrictive regulations of the Quebec and New Brunswick governments came into effect. The last section of the pamphlet deals with the quantity of pulpwood manufactured in Canada, contrasted with the quantity exported in an unmanufactured state; and shows us how much we lost in profit, work for our wage-earners, and the establishment of industries.

Roughly speaking, during both years, we manufactured forty per cent. of the pulpwood produced in the country and exported sixty per cent. to the United States. This sixty per cent. of our raw material was then manufactured by the Americans into pulp and paper, thus getting the work, the wages, the dividends, and the "home market" created by their work people. The brochure in question calculated that the 943,141 cords of Canadian pulp wood exported to the United States, was manufactured by them into 660,241 tons of pulp, worth \$13,528,481. Now they paid \$6,210,042 for the pulp wood. So, Canada lost, on this estimate, considerably more than as much again as she got for her raw material. As the report puts it, if we would manufacture our own wood into pulp at home, the Americans would pay us \$20.49 a ton for our pulp, instead of \$6.58 a cord for pulp wood.

The report contains some further inferences from these facts expressed very succinctly. It says:— "As the 1910 report of the United States pulp wood consumption has not been issued, comparison cannot

be made between the two countries for 1910. In 1909, however, the pulp wood shipped from Canada, consisting of spruce and poplar logs, furnished 22.8 per cent. of the entire pulp wood consumption of the United States. This means that 58 of the 253 pulp mills of the United States ran for the year: employed help and paid profits on raw products furnished by Canada. The three most important pulp wood States of the Union benefited from Canada's resources as follows: New York drew nearly one-half, or 48 per cent. of its pulp wood from Canadian forests; 18 per cent. of Maine's consumption was Canadian logs, and 20 per cent. of the pulp wood used in New Hampshire came from Canada. If the pulp wood exported in 1910 had been reduced to pulp in Canada, it would have supplied 80 mills of the average size of those in Canada. Thus 131 mills instead of 51 would have been operating in Canada, and advancing Canadian industry."

The figures as to the export by Provinces are particularly interesting to Quebecers. The Department of Customs reports the pulp wood export as follows:—\$779,000 cords, worth \$5,090,000, from the timber limits of Quebec; 90,000 cords, worth \$647,000, from New Brunswick, and 74,000 cords, worth \$473,000, from Ontario.

"It is interesting to note," the brochure proceeds, "to what extent provincial industry would have been increased if the pulp wood exported to the United States had been converted into wood pulp on Canadian soil. The 779,000 cords exported from Quebec would have supplied material for a year to fifty-six pulp mills of the average size operating in Quebec. In Ontario, five mills of the average size could have been kept running with the pulp logs exported from that province. The amount exported was sufficient to supply with wood twenty-four mills of the average size, with the result that five times the actual number of mills operating would have been at work if Canada had been far-seeing enough to manufacture their own raw products."

It is hardly necessary to point the moral. These figures show how much Ontario exported, in spite of her long-standing law prohibiting such export except from private lands. Quebec and New Brunswick will probably do better than they did before their new regulations came into effect. Every log we send out of the country in this way robs us of a legitimate and natural advantage we possess in holding a monopoly of the pulp wood of the continent. We should draw to Canada the entire pulp and paper industry of North America. It would be compelled to come to us, employ our workmen, and buy from our farmers, if we were to take the simple step of keeping at home our unmanufactured pulp wood—Montreal Star.
