Government Receives Full Share of Earnings

TORONTO, June 1. - The revealing of two noteworthy facts, viz., that Ontario Jockey Club racing is conducted upon a high plane, affording every possible protection to the public, and that attendance and wagering at the race courses is upon the decrease, constitute the result of an audit and probe of racing conditions conducted by the Ontario Government during the spring Woodbine 14 YEARS IN LEGISLATURE meet. The report of the investigators

Ever since the inception of the Betting Tax Act there has been criticism alleging that the Government has not been getting that which has been due it. There has been additional criticism alleging that the pari-mutuel machines are not promptly closed when the horses reach the judges' stand, with the alleged result that it has been possible for some bettors to see the start of a race and then rush in and place a bet upon the horse which gets

Take cognizance of these allegations. The Government, at the last session of the House, took extended powers to The last rafter of the new \$300,000 operation to the Government officials,

> The result has been both to indicate that the Jockey Club has been fair in its Government returns and that it has been conducting its meets upon a plane of honesty towards the public. The report sheds some light upon the little understood system of the pari-mutuel operators. It explains that on one par ticular day the Jockey Club had 74 ticket sellers, and that five minutes pefore the horses pass the judges' stand the ticket selling ceases in the members' stand and the ladies' department, and that checking is commenced at once. When the horses pass the judges' stand all ticket selling ceases and the checking is quickly done, each cashier immediately closing his ticket box, closing his cash box and rushing with all speed with his tickets to the ticket room and his cash to the cash room. On a pool of \$50,000 or over the club uses the following \$1,400 apportionment as its basis: \$700 to straight, \$400 to place and \$300 to show. The club pays out no odd cents to winners, but regards the coppers as "the breaks." At the last meet the "breaks"

amounted to \$8,355.78. The report points out that speed in calculation is of utmost importance as the money which is bet is turned over several times in the one afternoon. Thus, if the club does not pay out for one race before the next one commences the amount wagered at it

is reduced. Regarding the system generally the report says: "We observed closely cash methods and could not see any evidence of the short changing, which is supposed to exist at the race tracks. I think I can say that every precaution is taken to protect the public

"I am satisfied that the club has built up a system from long experience and the handling of races is done by a staff large in number, experienced, quick and accurate. The system in use to my mind, is excellent. I do not know how close to the system of the Ontario Jockey Club the other tracks adhere to, but from close observation I think it is only fair to say that the handling of pools is quite on a par with any high-grade office organization apart from racing."
