### WARWICK COUNCIL

Warwick, 18th Aug., 1913.  
The Council met to-day as per adjournment. Members all present.  
The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

Hobbs—Laird, that we go into a court of revision on the McGill drain, with the Reeve in the chair.—Carried.

The appeals of several parties were heard when it was moved by Mr. Dunn, seconded by Mr. Hobbs, that the Court of Revision on the McGill drain be adjourned till Monday, 15th day of Sept. at one o'clock and that the Clerk be instructed to write the engineer with reference to making the drain open through-out.—Carried.

By-law No. 11, levying a rate of 10 mills on the dollar, made up as follows: 2-10 mills to pay the County rate; 2-10 mills to pay the general school rate and 5-10 mills to meet the current expenses of the municipality was passed in the usual way.

Council met on the 4th inst. all the members present. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Mr. F. Tater's report for the construction of the proposed Grant Drain, and A. S. Code's reports for the construction of the Humphries—Hall Drain and the repair of the Sullivan Drain were read and considered.

The report for the proposed Grant Drain was referred back and the other two reports were adopted.

By-laws were passed imposing special drainage rates on lot 73, L. R. W. con., and by-laws for the construction of the Humphries—Hall Drain, and repair of the Sullivan Drain were provisionally adopted.

Mr. Thomson was appointed to serve copies of the Humphries—Hall drain by-law, and Mr. Tidball to serve copies of the Sullivan drain by-law.

Rawlings—Thomson—In favor of Robt. Tidball \$96.25 to pay men for work on bridge, con. 10; J. R. Addison \$25.40 for work on bridge, con. 10; W. N. Ironside \$80.41 cement, etc.; Barney Morningstar \$40.10 for gravel and work in gravel pit; W. Bryant \$9.20 publishing notice closing roads, etc., and \$45 on printing contract; Eric Coultis \$24.92, plank for split log drains for and Canada Co. cut bridge; R. Tidball to pay freight on bridge \$3.46; Verne Tidball \$4 filling in bridge and drawing plank and tank; Noah Stebbins \$5.40 for gravel; and John Melville \$10 balance due for work on Mud Creek bridge, con. 8.

Tidball—Thomson, that Robert Way and Caleb Travis be accepted as the Treasurer's bondsmen.—Carried.

Rawlings—Tidball, that Mr. Thomson be appointed commissioner on the Nesbit drain in place of Mr. Melville, who declines to act.

Thomson—Sitter, that the treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to pay the road commissioners' orders.—Carried.

For the motion, the Reeve and Messrs. Thomson and Sitter; against, Rawlings and Tidball.

The clerk was instructed to notify Philip Pemberton to remove a nuisance placed by him on the 18-19 con. road allowance.

Council adjourned to meet on Monday, the 1st day of September at 10 a. m., as a Court of Revision on the Humphries—Hall and Sullivan drain by-laws, and at 1 p. m. for general business.

It is a well-known fact that the Dairy Industry is one of the best assets of the farmers of Ontario to-day. Realizing this fact the management of the Western Fair have given a good deal of thought and attention to this department. In addition to their splendid building, whose only fault is its size, they have installed a cold storage system for both Cheese and Butter. Exhibitors may rest assured their goods will be properly cared for while at the Exhibition. The prize list has been changed considerably this year, instead of showing two cheese as in the past, the sections have been divided, and one cheese of each month's make, June, July and August, of both colored and white are asked for. The prize money is liberal and is extended to sixth place, giving more exhibitors a chance to win. Sections are also made for Canadian Flats and Stilton Cheese. In addition to the regular prizes, several local firms have kindly donated cash specials and silver cups to this department, making it very attractive. The buttermaking competition will be carried on every day of the Exhibition, and as there is a large Auditorium with plenty of good seating accommodation, this is a popular building. ### CHOP STUFF

B. B. Van Tuyl has been appointed general manager of Brewster's, Petrolia.

Miss Nina Whitehead, Strathroy, died last week after an illness extending over twenty years.

Messrs. J. H. Anderson, Oil Springs, Warden of the County, C. O. Fairbank, Petrolia, and H. J. Pettypiece, Forest, representing the County of Lambton, will meet delegates from most other counties of Ontario in Toronto this autumn, and discuss the great question of Railway Taxation.

A meeting was held in Toronto at which the organization of the Central Co-operative Fruit Growers Association for Ontario, was completed. The name is to be "The Co-operative Fruit Growers of Ontario, Limited." The following local associations have already joined:—Forest, Tilsonburg, Pelham, Durham, Oshawa, Walpole, Orono, St. Catharines, Brant, Oakville, Petrolia and Owen Sound. This organization expects to have from 35,000 barrels of apples to dispose of this year.

At a meeting of the Forest Fruit Growers' Association reports were presented from the different growers on the probable crop. Apples will be much lighter than was expected, there being possibly not more than 5,000 barrels suitable for shipping. In peaches and plums however, the prospects are that 20,000 baskets of the former and 30,000 of the latter will be shipped from that point, there being a bumper crop. Tomatoes will also be shipped in large quantities before the canning commences.

James L. McHattie, general agent for the Englewood union passenger station, Chicago, and a son of Mrs. John McHattie, of Petrolia, has been missing since Thursday, July 31st. This was the day Mr. McHattie returned from leave of absence granted him by the railroad, he leaving the station again almost immediately, complaining of lameness in one of his feet. He went home after going out, which was the last seen of him, his wife notifying the police, who are making every effort to locate him, when he failed to return. The accounts of the missing man are reported correct by the railway company and his record good.
