Condensed War News

MONDAY

London, Aug. 2.-The Germans have invaded the Duchy of Loxenburg and have seized the Government offices and talephones. They are marching on the French fortress at Longwy, according to sm official dispatch received here shortly after 4 o'clock this afternoon.

One German force crossed the French frontier near the Village of Cirey, be-tween Nancy and Strassburg and another German detachment, probably the 20th Infantry, last night invaled the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg, neutral territory between Belgium and Germany, and continued its march on the French forti-fied town of Longwy. fied town of Longwy.

According to an evening newspaper published at Liege, 20,000 German troops published at Liege, 20,000 German troops No vessel will be permitted to come in-No vessel will be permitted to come innear Nancy. They encountered French forces and were repulsed with heavy Josses. This news, however, lacks con-firmation.

London, Aug. 3 .- The Standard publiabes a report that the French aviator, Roland Garros, met and engaged a Ger-man airship in midair and rammed and destroyed it.

destroyed it. Berlin, Aug. 2.-A telegram from Kognigsberg says a Russian patrol has entered Eydtkuhuen, on the Russian border. It advanced to Bilderweitschen, near Edytkuhen, where it destroyed the local post office. A Russian column, which crossed the frontier at Schwinden, was accommanied by artillery. 


