LOCAL DEATH ROLL

MISS HELEN ROBBLEE Mrs. Archie F. Troop, Belleisle, received a telegram on Monday conveying the sad intelligence of the sudden death of her youngest sister, Miss Helen Robblee, at the home of her brother, Charles in Medford, Mass., on April 4th. Miss Robblee had been in failing health for the last six months. Her condition, however, was not considered grave until a few days before her death, she only being confined to her bed two days. Miss Robblee was the youngest daughter of the late John Robblee, of Lower Granville. She leaves three brothers, Charles, Roy and John, all of U. S. Army, and two sisters, Mrs. Fred Ammons, of Summerville, and Mrs. Archie F. Troop, Belleisle, besides a wide circle of friends who deeply deplore her early death, she only having reached the age of 27 years and two months. The funeral took place from the home of her brother Charles on Wednesday p. m. and was largely attended. Much sympathy is extended Mrs. Troop, this being the second sister she has been called to part with in a year, the other being Oleiva, wife of Mr. Harry Anthony of Lower Granville. She also lost her eldest brother, Harry, during the war at the memorable battle of Vimy Ridge.

MISS MABEL BOHAKER On Tuesday morning, March 29, the community was saddened to hear of the death of Mabel Bohaker, eldest daughter of Mr. T. Smith Bohaker, of Granville Ferry. Altho Miss Bohaker had been ill with tuberculosis for about three years, her death came as a shock at the end. She was 38 years of age, member of the English Church. She will be missed, not only by the family, but by all as she was one sweet and lovely girl. The funeral took place Thursday at one o'clock, conducted by Rev. R. A. Penny assisted by Rev. H. P. Patterson. Interment was in the Cemetery at Karsdale. Besides her parents there is left to mourn the lost one, sister Lillian, who cared for her during her illness, and one brother, Ralph Bohaker, of Karsdale.
