"1. One alfabet only, the Roman. 2. No capitals except begining sentences and proper names.

3. No dubling consonants in same sylabl; omision of all signs for vowel-length, except in 'close' sylabls the makron-hardly needed in riting. 4. Simpl signs for simpl sounds, viz . substitutes for cn, sch. 5. Omit superfluus (or useles) leters.

"Transition Orthografy" omits the makron except to avoid misunderstanding, and uses digrafs ch, sch, final b, d, for reformd p, t, silent h in sehen, etc.

We ar glad to see that Reform takes as standard "mesured," that is, liturgic, pronunciation of New High German, not dialectic shades, not cursory, evryday, coloqui-
