Jubilee of the Church of St. John the Evangelist, Waterville.

During the first week in October, the little Village of Waterville witnessed a most interesting series of Services and Meetings, all having some bearing upon the joyful fact that for fifty years its Church, built in 1845 and consecrated by Bishop Mountain in 1855, had been open week by week for prayer and praise.

The proceedings commenced on Friday, October 4th, when the Lord Bishop arrived, and in the evening gave a most interesting lecture on the Early History of the English Church, shewing that she is Apostolic in origin and at the same time freed from the superstitions of the middle ages; and that she has come down to us from the first days without break or shake to stand with extended hands between our Roman Catholic brethren on the one hand, and those who have deprived themselves of an Apostolic Ministry on the other, and to be an impustant factor, in God's providence, in the reat future reunion of Christendom.

On Saturday afternoon the Bishop received visitors for a couple of hours and in the evening held a Confirmation. The Church was full and the overflowing congregation both attentive and appreciative.

The Sunday Morning Service on October 6th was of an intensely interesting character. Many worshippers of by-gone years were present once more within the sacred walls of the good old Church. Amongst these was the only living patriarch of the congregation, Mr. William Wiggett, senior, who was one of the first two Churchwardens, a member of the building com-
