totalled 74 066. Almost 80 per cent of the visas went to immigrants in the family, refugee and humanitarian classes and the remainder to independent, business and retired immigrants. The number of visitor visas issued at Canadian missions in 1984 totalled 295 000, close to the 298 000 of the previous year. While there were additional visitor visa requirements for citizens of Bangladesh, Guatemala, Guyana, Jamaica, Peru and Sri Lanka, the number of these visas issued was balanced by visitor visa exemptions for citizens of Israel and Saudi Arabia.
