Lightning.....	Nāh-tun'-kun. (Lit., "Thunder-fire.")
Thunder.....	Nāh-tun'.
Rain.....	Tsin.
Snow.....	Zāh.
Hail.....	Chīn-lūh.
Fire.....	Kō ⁿ .
Aurora Borealis.....	Yū-kai ⁿ .
Water.....	Chu ⁿ .
Ice.....	T'tun. (A fragment of ice or floating ice is Thlū.)
Land, Earth.....	Nun.
Sea.....	Chō ⁿ -chōh. ("Big water.")
River.....	Hun.
Lake.....	Vun.
Valley.....	Kū-nā'-trī.
Mountain.....	D'dhāh.
Island.....	Njūh.
Stone, Rock.....	Chī.
Copper.....	Thē'tsra ⁿ .
Iron.....	Chī-tsih.
Tree.....	Tē-chun'.
Wood.....	Tē-chun' or Tsrōh.
Leaf.....	Chīt-un.
Bark.....	Bā-trī. (The bark of the birch, however, is always K'kih.)
Grass.....	K'klōh.
Poplar.....	T'tōh. (Populus tremuloides, T'tōh-zōh; P. balsamifera (?) T'tōh.)
Birch.....	Hkā'-t'tōh; alder, kōh.
Willow.....	Kaih-tluk'. (This is the common upland willow; another species on the lowlands, and of which the Indians sometimes eat the soft new wood, is kaih-tzū'h —perhaps the true generic name for willow is kaih.)
Spruce.....	T'tsī-vēh'.
Flesh, meat.....	S'sih; salted meat, shō-vī-lēt'.
Dog.....	Hklai ⁿ ; a small dog, thlug-a-tsul'; my dog, sī'-lik; thy dog, nī-lik; his or her dog, vī-lik.
Buffalo, fossil.....	Ah-kīh'; musk-ox and domestic cattle, āh-kīh' (same).
Bear (Black).....	S'sōh; grizzly bear, s'sih; white bear, sīh-tā'-kaih; red bear (cinnamon bear), s'sōh-tā-tsīk'.
Wolf.....	Zōh.
Reindeer.....	Vnt-zaih'.
Moose.....	Tīn-jī-yuk'.
Beaver.....	Tsē.
Fox.....	Nā-kudh', or nā-ku ⁿ dh; black fox, nā-kudh'-rzī ⁿ .
