Lightning	Näh-tun'-kun. (Lit., "Thunder-fire.")
Thunder.....	Näh-tun'.
Rain.....	Tsñ.
Snow	Zäh.
Hail.....	Chín-lüh.
Fire.....	Köñ.
Aurora Borealis....	Yü-kaiñ.
Water.....	Chun'.
Ice	T'tun. (A fragment of ice or floating ice is Thlü.)
Land, Earth.....	Nun.
Sea	Chöñ-chöh. ("Big water.")
River.....	Hun.
Lake.....	Vun.
Valley.....	Kü-nä'-trí.
Mountain	D'dhäh.
Island.....	Njüh.
Stone, Rock	Chī.
Copper.....	Thié'tsrañ.
Iron.....	Chī-tsih.
Tree	Té-chun'.
Wood	Té-chun' or Tsröh.
Leaf.....	Chít-un.
Bark.....	Bä-trí. (The bark of the birch, however, is always K'kih.)
Grass.....	K'klöh.
Poplar.....	T'töh. (<i>Populus tremuloides</i> , T'töh-zöh; <i>P. balsamifera</i> (?) T'töh.)
Birch.....	Hkä'-t'töh; alder, köh.
Willow.....	Kaih-thuk'. (This is the common upland willow; another species on the lowlands, and of which the Indians sometimes eat the soft new wood, is kaih-tzü'h — perhaps the true generic name for willow is kaih.)
Spruce	T'tsi-vél'.
Flesh, meat.....	S'sih; salted meat, shō-vi-lët'.
Dog.....	Hklañ; a small dog, thlug-a-tsul'; my dog, sî'-lîk; thy dog, nî-lîk; his or her dog, vi-lîk.
Buffalo, fossil.....	Ah-kîh'; musk-ox and domestic cattle, äh-kîh' (same).
Bear (Black)	S'soh; grizzly bear, s'sih; white bear, sîh-tâ'-kaih; red bear (cinnamon bear), s'soh-tâ-tsîk'.
Wolf.....	Zöh.
Reindeer.....	Vnt-zaih'.
Moose.....	Tín-ji-yuk'.
Beaver.....	Tsë.
Fox.....	Nä-kudh', or nä-kuñdh; black fox, nä-kudh'-rzîñ.
