FIFTY ACRES ON TOWN LINE BOUGHT FOR SUBDIVISION

A. G. C. Dinick Secures Property Above Massey Farm Held by Young Syndicate.

Fifty acres on the east side of the mainline, and directly north of the Massey Farm, were bought yesterday afternoon by A. G. C. Dinick at a figure in the neighborhood of \$180,000. The vendors were a syndicate headed by George A. Young.

The property is described as the northwest corner of lot 15, con. B. Township of Scarborough, and is long and narrow, running up to St. Clair avenue and being bisected at the top by Davies road.

Surveys for subdivision of the tract were made by the syndicate, and have been approved by the railway board, making the property ready for immediate retailing. J. L. Burnard, realty agent, negotiated the transaction.

BOEHM PROPERTY ON BELT LINE GOES WELL

M. S. Boehm and Company are meeting with a very heavy demand for their Fairbanks Heights property. On Saturday and Monday \$60,000 in sales were registered, a lot of it workmen's sites, but most of it old belt line frontage.

Four buildings, supply firms and one manufacturer have bought the Boehm belt line frontage, and options on two big plots are out for other manufacturers.

BIG BISCUIT WORKS ON STERLING ROAD

Chadwick and Beckett, acting in trust for a manufacturer, were yesterday granted a permit for the erection of a four-story brick biscuit factory on the east side of Sterling road, the cost to be \$65,000.

JOINT STATION NOW IS PROPOSED

C. P. R. and C. N. R. May Have One Fine Building at Leaside.

A joint Canadian-Northern and Canadian Pacific Railway station at Leaside is now planned, and negotiations with this end in view are now under way between the two railways. An official of the C. N. R. stated to the World that should the joint station be decided upon it will be erected on a large site at the eastern end of Dundas avenue, and would be in the centre of a small public park.

While the new joint station will not be built on the large scale of the main line stations of these two railways, it is stated that it will nevertheless, from an artistic point of view, be a credit to Leaside and be commodious enough to meet all demands that will be placed upon it.

KILLED GUIDE AND ATE BODY

Ghastly Tragedy in Alaska is Disclosed in a Letter.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 24.—(Can. Press.)—Tortured by the furies of an Alaskan winter, subsisting thirty days on skins of dead animals and finally driven insane by an eight-day period of starvation, Henry LeClaire, a French trapper, killed and partially ate the body of Len Lemieux, declared to have been a guide of the Hudson Bay Co., near Mile 58, British Columbia. Such is the tale unfolded in a letter received here.

According to the letter LeClaire and Lemieux tasted no morsel of any kind for eight days on an extended hunt, on which they started in December. In a deserted shack, 75 miles from the coast, the two men awaited the other to sleep, for the killing of one meant food for the other. Lemieux was killed, however, being stabbed in the heart eight times. Twenty-three
