Long Shots Win on Friday Sixth Day at Woodbine Park

Dehaven and Supreme in First and Last Races the Only
Favorites to Land—Field Horses in Front Twice
—Fine Card for Getaway Day.

Friday, the Ontario Jockey Club's sixth day of lawful racing of their second meeting, furnished a delightful afternoon's sport, especially as the wind did not blow from the west towards Woodbine Park. The weather was fine and warm, and the attendance again close to the 500,000 mark. Two favorites and five long shots ran on record as the winners, and there were a lot of other luscious ones in the money. The biggest prize of the afternoon was paid about Immune, third in the second race, \$64.70 for 12. Four of the beaten choices, Shrapnel, Zindel, Stake and Cap and Cynosure, ran outside the money, and Wodan, the 4-to-1 second choice, ran third. It is now up to closing day, with the best card of the meeting down for decision. The chief feature is the 2 1/2 miles handicap, and there are three other races, each with \$1000 added money. Immune made the early pace in the opening event, and looked like the winner turning into the stretch, but the best she could do was split the Seagram pair, Dehaven finishing strongly for a head victory. Sweet Oleen, third, a half-length away. The field was lost in the race.

Size of Little Bigger. Little Bigger's size in the third was to top the also-runs, the he was a pronounced favorite, with Wodan second choice, and the he was worse. Blue Cap, the half-breed, showed the way until Gypsy Blain representing the field, drove in front of the last furlongs, to win by a long margin. Immune beat Little Bigger for the show.

Forest Star nosing out Dick's Pet for the place. As set forth in the dope, Stake and Cap is not at her best these days. She again merely figured as a beaten favorite.

The African at Every Jump. The African won the steeplechase at every jump, with Mopeth and March Court close in attendance, though the latter two exchanging places at the second and last jump. At the last two fences the African hobbled, but recovered and won with something to spare. Cynosure fell at the clubhouse bank first time round.

In the sixth, for maidens, Sparkler, representing the field, again won by a length. Collector second by four, and Wodan third, two lengths ahead of Prime Mover. The three in the money ran in that order the six furlongs, with the favorite moving up fourth at the lower turn, and this the procession came home. The closing event of the day was a three-horse race, that Supreme won, as the form players anticipated. St. Leger, an best Gallop for the place, the rest never dangerous or even backed. Gallop was the pacemaker to the stretch.
