

RECRUITING PROCEEDS AT A SPLENDID PACE

Hundred and Twenty-Three Attended for Overseas Service in Toronto Yesterday.

MARCHED OUT TO CAMP

Ninety-Fifth, With Lt.-Col. Barker in Command, at Exhibition Grounds Now.

Enlistments in Toronto reached a high figure again yesterday, a total of 123 men being attested for overseas service.

Completed figures for Monday show that 813 men offered their services in the one day.

Recruiting for the artillery has been stopped for the present.

The Royal Grenadiers Overseas Battalion, which had a nucleus of 117 men, took over 172 more from the recruiting depot yesterday.

An issue of snowshoes and moccasins to be made to the scouts of the overseas troops now training in Toronto will enable them to carry out their training right thru the winter months.

An interesting point in connection with the snowshoes is that they are stated to be already in stock, being part of an issue of equipment made at the time the Scouts of Canada (1885) to the militia then stationed at Toronto.

ST. KITT'S FLOUR MILLS DESTROYED BY FLAMES

Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars' Damage Done by Fire of Supposed Incendiary Origin.
