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An English Admiral then lay in Louisbourg Harbour with seven of his Majesty's Ships of the Line well appointed and strongly mann'd; and at the same time the Arrival of Admiral Leftock with the English Squadron and Armament from England, destined to be employed up the River St. Lawrence in the Expedition of Canada, was daily expected on the Coast; the Massachuse's Governor therefore, to give the former of these Admirals the best Intelligence, that could be obtained of the Strength of the French Squadron, fent a small Schooner to reconnoitre it in Chebucto Harbour, and carry him a distinct Account of it; which was executed; and from the Condition, in which it was found, it was thought by the best Judges, that the Ships, which the English Admiral had with him at Louisbourg were of sufficient Force to have attacked and destroyed the French Ships in Chebucto; which he was much pressed to attempt by a Sea Commander of great Diftinction, then Governor of Cape Breton; and at the same time the Massachusets Governor fent three fmall Vessels to cruize on several Parts of the Coast, in order to fall in with Admiral Leftock's Squadron, which was still expected in America, to give him Information of the French Ships, and pilot him into Chebueto; which must have secured the utter Destruction of the French Squadron.
