**CALL STRIKE IF  
MEN CONVICTED**  
Industrial Workers of World  
Threaten International  
Movement if Prosecu-  
tion Succeeds.

LAWRENCE, Mass., Oct. 3.—(Can. Press).—Announcement of the beginning of a campaign to bring about a possible general strike of members of the industrial workers of the world in this country and abroad was made here today. The announcement was contained in a statement signed by Wm. D. Haywood as chairman of a joint meeting of the Editor and Government defence committee, the central committee of the local union and of the general organizers of the Industrial Workers of the World now in this city. The statement follows:  
"It was agreed to extend the agitation for a general strike to make nation-wide and international if possible, to take place in the event of the prisoners not being acquitted, or in the further event of the government attempting unduly to prolong the trial. General agitation will be begun everywhere looking for this end. A proclamation will be issued containing a pronouncement of the principles of the I. W. W. adopting the general strike as the organization's weapon against government by injunction and against the imprisonment of innocent men. Lawrence will be the centre of the movement and it will be upon signal from Lawrence that such a strike will be declared if necessary."

**ST. CLAIR CASE  
TO BE APPEALED**

Judge Denton Granted Mr. Raney's Request, and Will Submit Five Questions.

The St. Clair case will be appealed, Judge Denton yesterday morning granting the application of W. E. Raney, K.C., for leave to take the case to an appeal court.  
In granting permission Judge Denton pointed out that he had granted a reserve case in such a form as to bring the whole case, both as to law and evidence, into review. The following are the questions which the judge will put before the court of appeal:  
1. Was the bulletin in question obscene printed matter, within the meaning of sec. 207 of the criminal code, having regard to the form in which it was issued, and to the manner in which it was found to have been circulated by the accused?  
2. Was I right in ruling that the occasion of the publication was such as might be for the public good, within the meaning of sec. 207 of the code?  
3. Was I right in ruling that there was evidence of excess, beyond what the public good required, in the manner, extent and circumstances of the publication?  
4. Was there any evidence tendered by the accused which was improperly rejected on any branch of the case?  
5. If question four is answered in the affirmative, was any substantial wrong or miscarriage of justice occasioned at the trial by such rejection, as called for by sec. 109 of the code?

**LEFT LARGE ESTATE**

Merrit A. Cleveland of Brookport Had Money in Toronto.  
In the surrogate court yesterday morning, letters of probate were applied for on the Ontario possessions of Merritt A. Cleveland of Brookport, N.Y., who died on May 19 last. The value of these possessions is \$302,812. The largest item is that of \$151,233, on deposit in a bank here, and in addition to this a farm near Prescott is valued at \$8900, and a St. Lawrence River Island at \$1500.  
Regarding an additional \$150,000 bank deposit, one of the affidavits says the money rightly belongs to the claimants, Miles and Stephen Cleveland of Watertown, because they were partners.  
Mr. Cleveland's possessions outside of Canada amounted to \$400,000. His widow, living in Brookport, receives a life use of one-third of the real estate, cash in bank, and other assets, totaling about \$51,000. One quarter of the remainder is left to each of Miles L. Cleveland, Helen L. March, Harold and Florence Cleveland, all children of the dead man.

**THE PINK LADY HERE NEXT WEEK**  
Miss Hazel Dawn and Original New York Company Will Appear at the Princess.

**ORCHESTRA PLAYS AT ALL CONCERTS**  
Nahan Franko and His Musicians Will Be Heard in Most Beautiful Orchestral Numbers.

The seat sale for the engagement of "The Pink Lady" at the Princess Theatre next week with Wednesday and Saturday matinees, opened at the Princess Theatre box office yesterday morning. It should be noted that this is the original New York and London company with all the favorites. The indications are that the engagement will be of the record breaking variety. Those who have not already made their seat reservations will be wise to get them in early. "The Pink Lady" has been the unquestioned triumph of the musical comedy stage of the past decade. A record of five hundred performances at the New Amsterdam Theatre in New York and a few engagements throughout the country last year was followed with a triumph for twenty weeks at the Globe Theatre in London last spring and summer. The production to be seen here is made upon an unusually elaborate scale and is new throughout. In the big company are such New York and London favorites as Frank Lalor, Miss Hazel Dawn, Miss Alice Dovey, Miss Alice Hegeman, Jack Henderson, Crawford Kent, Ted Brouty, William Clifton, Miss Frances Gordon, Eddie Morris, Miss Flora Crobbie, F. Newton Lindo, Maurice Hegeman, Joseph Carey, Henry M. Johnson, Ben Lessett, Miss Marie Benedict, W. Jackson Sadler, A. S. Humerson and an exceptionally beautiful chorus. The evening performance begins at 8 o'clock, and the Wednesday and Saturday matinees at 2 o'clock.

While a great deal of attention has been paid to the quality of the singers at the approaching musical festival to be held at the Arena, the orchestral features of this great event must not be overlooked. Mr. Nahan Franko is bringing an orchestra of sixty of the finest instrumentalists in the City of New York, who will at every concert, be heard in the most beautiful numbers in the whole repertoire of orchestral music. Among the composers to be represented during the eight concerts in purely instrumental offerings are: Wagner, Beethoven, Bach, Goldmark, Saint-Saens, Liszt, Grieg, Verdi, Weber, Brahms, Delibes, Humperdinck, Berlioz, Mozart, Rossini and Elgar. Special attention will be given to Wagner at the concerts on Tuesday, Oct. 8, and Thursday, Oct. 10. At the Tuesday concert, the overture to "Der Meistersinger" and the finale to "Das Rheingold" will be given. "Der Meistersinger" is admittedly the greatest of all humorous, and its overture is a perfect achievement. The listener will note the lovely lyric quality of Wagner's prize song, and the grandeur of the Lutheran chorale sung in the opera by Hans Sachs. "Das Rheingold" is the first of the four works which constitute Wagner's great national achievement, the closing episode of this section of the work. The gods are depicted as entering Valhalla over a rainbow bridge with the gold that has been stolen from the Rhine maidens. In this beautiful tone-picture the cries of the maidens lamenting their loss will be heard by the attentive listener. Wagner also figures largely on the Thursday program, and is represented by many of his very greatest achievements. With "Tannhauser" he may be said to have at one stroke achieved immortality, altho he was still young. If he had never composed anything else, but this overture, he would have still lived in the memories of generations of concert goers. The work was produced in 1845, and the themes of the overture depict the warring of earthly lusts with heavenly love. The "Love Death" episode from "Tristan and Isolde" is the greatest piece of love music ever composed. Tristan dying has sent for his beloved Isolde, she is the wife of another. He expires in her arms and the "Love Death" is the passionate expression of Isolde's grief and unending love as she passes away. The prelude to "Parsifal" gives a characteristic idea of that exquisitely spiritual work, in which Wagner tried to convey to music all his mystic religious beliefs. It is this quality as well as its marvelous interweaving of themes that gives the prelude its peculiar distinction. Nothing is loved, he in the whole of that great series known as "The Nibelungen Ring" than Wotan's farewell and the magic fire music from "Die Walkure." Wotan, the great stricken, is compelled to punish his daughter Brunhilde for disobedience. He sends her to sleep for a long period of years, but for her protection, he evokes the god of fire, Loki, and places a ring of flames around her. In the orchestral setting the play of the flames is exquisitely suggested.

**Rules Governing the Contest**

- Each picture represents only one proverb. Where contestants are not certain as to the correct proverb represented, they will be permitted to send five (5) answers (not more) to each proverb illustration. If the correct answer is given, incorrect answers will not count against a contestant.
- Only one answer may be written upon a single coupon. Extra coupons must be used for additional answers, and all coupons of the same number must be kept together in making up the set.
