

TURKISH SHELLS FALL NEAR KING

Nicholas of Montenegro and Numbers of Russian Royalty Under Fire—Montenegrins Rout Turks.

RIEKA, Nov. 18.—(Can. Press).—King Nicholas, accompanied by his son-in-law, the Russian grand duke, Peter Nikolaievitch, and the grand duchess, embarked Friday on a lake steamer to view the operations in front of Scutari. The steamer immediately became a target for Turkish shells, which fell unpleasantly close to the boat.

His majesty, on the steamer, followed the work of the Montenegrino centre column on the plain before Scutari. At noon a heavy bombardment opened on all sides. Montenegrin shells several times struck the highest point of Mount Tarabosch, dense clouds of smoke arising.

At 3 o'clock in the afternoon a Turkish battery occupying an exceedingly strong position at Golez was silenced. The Turks evacuated the position amid the cheers of the Montenegrins. Subsequently shells struck a magazine in the town and flames were seen to shoot up. After this successful bombardment, fourteen battalions of infantry crossed the Karl River to the northeast, and joining hands with the troops on that side, made a united assault on the Turkish positions to the east of the town, driving the enemy out.

Heroic Defence Futile. Meanwhile a division, under command of General Martinovich, had great success on the opposite side of the Boyana River, in the direction of San Giovanni di Medua. The division encountered three thousand Turks, who occupied the slopes of Mount Barabusch, overlooking the Drin River. A severe engagement ensued, lasting all afternoon. The Turks defended the position heroically, but were unable to withstand the stronger Montenegrin artillery fire and gradually withdrew. The Montenegrins followed this up by attacking the whole front and driving the Turks in headlong flight towards Alessio. The enemy left many dead and wounded on the battlefield. The Montenegrin losses also were heavy.

EAGER TO HEAR NAVAL PROGRAM

Intense Public Interest in the House Opening on Thursday—Seating Capacity Overtaxed.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—(Special).—There was no cabinet session on Saturday. The entire cabinet took a day off and Premier Borden, Hon. W. T. White, Hon. T. W. Crothers and Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes went out to Lansdowne Park and watched old McGill defeat Varsity for intercollegiate honors.

Practically everything is in readiness for the opening on Thursday next. "The cards are stacked for what I believe will be a great session," was the way one of the ministers summed up the situation today. Not very often in the past has such interest been awakened on Parliament Hill in an approaching session. "Standing room only" signs are hung around the corridors of the house of commons, every available seat being taken for the opening day.

Enquiries as to the probable date of Premier Borden's announcement of his naval proposal are pouring in from all parts of the country, and it is being predicted that when the prime minister rises to make his much anticipated naval speech he will have the biggest and most representative audience that has ever greeted any speaker in a Canadian Parliament.
