STABS HIS FATHER.

Savage Attack on Man 70 Years of Age in a Quarrel.

Belleville, April 7 .- George Cameron, a young farmer of Carlaw Township, in this county, is under arrest, charged with stabbing his father, 70 years of age, in a quarrel over property.
