STANDARD MILK CAN BILL
PRINCIPLE IS NOW ADOPTED

Committee on Agriculture Accepts the Redrafted Measure—Farmers Will Benefit.

Ottawa, April 20.—(Special.)—The committee on agriculture this morning adopted the principle of the bill introduced by Arch. Campbell (Centre York), establishing the standard milk can, and recommended the following bill as redrafted: (1) All cans or vessels of a capacity of one gallon or over, used for the purpose of buying or selling milk by measure, shall contain one Dominion standard gallon as defined by section 15 of the Weights and Measures Act 49 Vic. chap. 104, or some multiple thereof. (2) Such cans or vessels when of a capacity of eight gallons shall be known as a standard, when containing four gallons as a half standard, and when containing two gallons as a quarter standard. (3) All vessels referred to in this act shall be subject to verification under the general provisions of the Weights and Measures Act, and shall have the capacity thereof engraved or stamped thereon. (4) All vessels of a capacity of one gallon and over now in use for the purpose of buying or selling milk by measure, which have not been verified and stamped by an inspector or assessor, must within three months of the passing of this act, be presented for verification. All vessels not so verified and stamped, or containing more than one gallon or a multiple thereof shall be stamped with their capacity to the nearest quart thereof. Other vessels dealing with the administration of the law and the penalties for its violation.

W. F. Maclean (South York), and Mr. Blair (Peel), advocated the bill in the house.

The committee ordered 500 copies of the bill to be printed for circulation. As the bill has been strongly opposed from the milk dealers and one time the Canadian Retail Grocers' Association strongly opposed it.

CONTROLLERS AFTER CASH COMMISSION TO PAY RENT

Building Outlook Continues to Improve—Public Library Plans—Matters at the City Hall.

The insurance commission will have to pay rent for holding its sessions in the Toronto city hall, altho they thought it should be free of charge. Property Commissioner Harris put the rental at \$25 a day, and in spite of a protest the board of control endorsed his action. The commission will meet in Toronto on the 25th inst., and it isn't likely that the rent will bother the insurance commissioners very much.

The board of control decided that the city had already paid enough money in connection with the municipal power report, and they refused a request for an additional grant for the printing of it.

More Park Property.
The offer of H. S. Mara to sell two lots on Port Rowland-street for \$4500 in the park area, west of Dufferin-street was accepted by the board.

On the recommendation of the assessment commissioner the Hamilton-street school property will be sold to H. T. Borthwick and M. Leroy for \$2500. It is said the property is to be used for a bakery.

George Somerville will be given a three years' lease of the east and south sides of Harbour-square with freight shed at \$6250 per year.

Several improvements have yet to be made in the new plans for the public library before they will be adopted. Building permits for April are away ahead of the same month last year. They promise to aggregate a million dollars before the month is thru. In April, 1905, the permits reached \$898,196.

During the last three months the city legal department has been successful in ten cases, lost one and settled six. Civic cases pending in the superior and county court number 83.

Jenkins, the oldest conductor on the Galt, Preston & Hespeler Street Railway, and a popular official with his associates and the traveling public, met with an accident at the company's car barns here last night from the effects of which he died at the Galt Hospital this afternoon.

Jenkins was running his car into the barns after the last trip and jumped too near the door, which was open. The moving car pushed him forward and he was crushed to death by a speck of 7 inches crushing his body in a terrible manner and breaking many bones.

So terrible was the crush that the carbox in the hands of the unfortunate man punched a hole in the side of the car, from which the paint was also scratched off.
