GEORGIAN BAY STEAMER FOUNDERS WITH 26 SOULS

Thirteen of Crew and Same Number of Passengers Undoubtedly Lost in Sinking of J. L. Jones Off Cape Croker on Thursday or Friday Last.

Owen Sound, Nov. 27.—(Special.)—It is practically certain that the last has been seen of the steamer J. L. Jones. Last Thursday afternoon the steamer, which belongs to the Crawford Tug Company of Warton, left Owen Sound on her regular trip to Peninsula and Manitoulin Island ports. It was her last trip of the season, and she carried a very heavy load of freight, besides twelve or fifteen passengers. She was reported as passing Griffith's Island and Cape Croker. Lights the same evening, and is said to have been seen on Friday off Barrow Bay.

Nothing further was heard of her, though she should have called at Lion's Head, for which place she had a quantity of freight and a number of passengers. Messages were sent in all directions, but without result.

The owners hoped the steamer was lying in shelter, so did not give up hope, but this afternoon a message was received stating that Indians had found wreckage and a lifeboat from the missing steamer, cast upon Christian Island. It is therefore almost a certainty that she has foundered.

The Jones was under command of Capt. James Crawford, one of the owners, and carried a crew of twelve men. Among the passengers were T. Donaldson, manager, Wolverton Fish Company; Mrs. Lyons and her son, Mr. Alex Lyons, of Owen Sound.

SMELTERS AND REFINERIES TO TREAT CANADIAN ORES SHOULD BE BUILT

Senator McMullen Says the Most Wonderful Thing is the Mines—Mr. Scott Takes Credit for Government for Prosperity.

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—(Special.)—In the senate to-day Hon. Mr. Scott, continuing the debate on the address, could not agree that providence, unaided had given Canada the prosperity that had come with the Liberal government. The government had done something to help. During the 18 Conservative years prior to 1896, the bank deposits had increased only at the rate of \$6,724,000 a year, and since that time the annual increase had been at the rate of \$34,000,000 a year, or six times as much as under the Conservatives. The aggregate trade had increased four million a year under the Conservatives and at the rate of \$28,000,000 a year under the Liberals. As the land was as fertile and the sun as bright under the Conservatives as during the Liberal period, the government must have had something to do with promoting the great increase of prosperity.

Just Lower Tariff.
 Mr. Loughheed had hardly been fair in stating the Liberals had promised free trade, he pointed out that the tariff had its aim in the direction of lower tariff. The Conservatives had established protection, and made it impossible for the Liberals to introduce free trade without destroying vested interests. All the Liberal government had said it would do or had attempted to do, was to modify the high protection of Conservatives and bring the tariff toward a revenue basis.

Mr. Scott said the government favored clean elections, and wanted the best sort of a campaign. Suggestions from the opposition would be welcomed. Personally, Mr. Scott said that he favored compulsory voting and that should be prominent residents of the districts in which they acted.

The Modus Vivendi.
 Senator Loughheed had indicated that the British government had not warranted in the action it had taken in the matter of the Newfoundland modus vivendi. Hon. Mr. Scott said he had looked carefully into the matter and thought the British government had only made one mistake, that was in allowing Americans to make use of purchase money in the purchase of the statistics of Canada and of Newfoundland. The United States evidently had recognized this mistake, for the Americans had not done so. Under no circumstances would the government lay hands upon private property.

Resuming the debate upon the address, Mr. Campbell (Centre York) took exception to Mr. Cockshutt's statement that the corruption shown in the London by-election was unparalleled. He thought that more corruption could be found in some past municipal elections in Toronto, or in the exposures before the insurance commission.

He defended Mr. Hyman and gave it as his opinion that he had no guilty knowledge of anything in the by-election. He thought there had been more corruption on the other side when Sir John Carling defeated Hyman in 1891. Paying money to men for their votes did no good. You might as well throw your money away.

At least, that has been my experience, said Mr. Campbell, who was quite disconcerted by the laughter and applause.

LIBERALS WASTE NO WORDS ON LORDS' AMENDMENTS TO EDUCATION BILL

National Federation Demand That Question of Right to Veto Will of People Be Settled Once and for All.

London, Nov. 27.—The intensity of the political feeling aroused by the treatment of the education bill in the house of lords found expression to-day in an emergency meeting of the general committee of the National Liberal Federation, at which a resolution was unanimously adopted, urging the government to reject the lords' amendments to the bill, and "resolutely to determine that the present parliament shall not come to an end until steps are taken to bring to a final arbitration the question whether the house of peers should any longer possess the right to veto the will of the people, as declared by the house of commons."

The meeting was the largest and most representative of its kind which had assembled during the last twenty years. The speakers warmly denounced the action of the peers, declaring that the house of commons should not waste another day in considering the amendments to the bill, which should be returned to the house of lords without debate, and the Liberal government ought to apply the only remedy which must be drastic and final.

A letter from Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman was read, in which the premier said that it was realized by all Liberals that the house of lords would hasten to assert itself as the instrument of Unionism, as soon as the country rendered a verdict against the Unionist government and the Unionist policy.

Continuing, the letter said: "Still, we may plead guilty to a certain sense of surprise at the violence of the manifestation, now that it has come. The education bill, as passed by the house of commons, was a bill which the country demanded. It is not a makeshift terms at the general election. It now seems to have been turned into a travesty of its original form. As amended, it perpetuates all its mistakes, and extends the very grievances and wrongs fixed upon the country by the Act of 1902. Of one thing you may rest assured:—

"We will have no tampering with the main principles upon which our bill is founded. If within those limits an arrangement can be devised, it will be made for us. If not, it will be for us to see that on this question of education, and on others, a way is found by which the wishes of the country may be made to prevail."

GLOOM AT WARTON.

Warton, Nov. 27.—This town is sunk in gloom. The coasting steamer J. L. Jones, owned by the Crawford Tug Company, it is now conceded, foundered off Cape Croker on Thursday afternoon and all hands were lost. The crew consisted of twelve men from Warton, and the blow to the town is a severe one.

The Jones, which plied between Owen Sound, Warton and Manitoulin Island ports, was one of the staunchest steamers on the Georgian Bay, and was commanded by one of the best and most experienced men on the lakes, Capt. Crawford.

Part of the cabin, a lifeboat and two disabled bodies have been found by Indians on the north shore of the Christian Islands. Boats are now out from here, Owen Sound, Penstangulshene, and Parry Sound looking for survivors and wreckage but it is hardly likely any thing or anybody will be found.

The boat carried a good list of passengers, and the following crew: Capt. J. V. Crawford, Mate E. Lennox, Wheelman W. Ross, George McEwan, Engineers Chas. N. Shaw and W. Sadler, Fireman Tom Simmonds, L. Simmonds, L. MacVittie, Deckhands Jas. Tilley, George Smith, Cook Frank Jackson and Assistant Cook M. Clark.

Coasting boats carry no booking list, and there may have been one or two more passengers than the following, who are known to have been on board: T. J. Donaldson, Dan McVoy, of Providence Bay and three unknown men on their way to Manitoulin Island to work for Capt. Graham.

"Under No Circumstances Will Government Lay Hands on Private Property," Reply of Prime Minister—Debate on the Address Continued in House of Commons.

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—(Special.)—The house grew listless this afternoon as the debate on the address progressed, although Archie Campbell, whose speech faintly suggested a candidate's sermon upon trial for a call to the ministry, was loudly applauded as he closed with what Dr. Stockton afterwards called a "venerable peroration."

STRIKERS TURN DOWN OFFER TO LEAVE QUESTION IN HANDS OF ONTARIO RAILWAY BOARD

Aldermen Confer With Head of Street Railway Union in Effort to Bring Parties Together—No Cars Run Last Night on Urgent Request of Mayor Biggar.

Hamilton, Nov. 27.—(Special.)—Everything passed off peacefully to-night, the cars being taken in about 9 o'clock.

Peace negotiations are dragging along slowly. Ald. Stewart, MacLeod, Clarke and Findlay are trying to get the board and the company together again on arbitration. The company will consent to make an unconditional reference to all matters in dispute to the Ontario railway and municipal board, and the union refused that before the aldermen think the men would get a fair deal from the board.

They had a conference with W. D. Mahon, Fred Fay and the executive this evening. The union explained its position to the aldermen, who then waited upon the company. They will not give out any information about their conferences further than to say that the aldermen and the union officers were in agreement to refer the matter to arbitration.

Col. Denison testified that Crowe was in a crowd of about 1000, that were raining bricks down upon the car that was crowded with men. Cars Run by Drunks.
 As an instance of the regard the company has for life and property, cars are being operated by drunken crews. Last night a strikebreaker had to be taken off a car and locked up on the charge of being drunk and disorderly. He gave the name of Hugh Craig, and was bailed out by a cash deposit of \$10. This morning he skipped out. This morning a drunken crew ran a car without a tender about the city, and they insulted the company's officers who remonstrated with them. The police claim that the crew not only ran the car at a dangerous rate of speed, but pointed revolvers at citizens. The leader chased them off the car, and put another gang in charge. It is thought that those removed from the car have left the city. Many of the strikebreakers have deserted.

AYLESWORTH IS CALLED BY NEW QUEBEC MEMBER

Asked to Give Authority for Statement That Fires of Sectional Hate Were Being Kindled.

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—(Special.)—Mr. Robitaille, the new member from the County of Quebec, will enquire of the ministry on Thursday next as to whether Mr. Aylesworth made the remarks attributed to him in The Globe on Oct. 25, charging that the fires of sectional hate were being kindled in the County of Quebec, and that the opponents of Laurier in that county were digging the grave of British institutions in Canada.

If the minister admits the statement, he is asked to give his authority and reason for making it.

Mr. Gauvreau (Liberal—Temiscouata) will ask the government as to its intention regarding the express service on the line of the I.C.R. There is now a monopoly in the hands of the C.P.R., who refuse to establish offices at many stations. The government will be asked as to the establishing of an express line on the C.P.R. thru the railway commission.

CANADA'S DEBT.

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—(Special.)—The public accounts for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1906, show the revenue of Canada to have been \$80,189,380, and the expenditure was \$87,240,640 on the fiscal year ended June 30, 1906, which, allowing \$2,318,000 placed to sinking fund account, means a net addition of \$8,831,100 to the public debt for the year. The net debt is now, therefore, \$287,042,977.

MORE M. P.'S FOR WEST.

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—(Special.)—The population of the two new prairie provinces, as shown in the quinquennial census, means that in the proposed readjustment of their parliamentary representation this session, Alberta will probably be given seven seats and Saskatchewan ten.
