The Ex-Ontario Premier Will  
Remain at Ottawa.

LUCKY LIBERAL LAWYERS

Who Will Get the Cream of the Work  
at the Many House Committees.

What the Opposition Members Did in  
Canada Yesterday—They Will Be No  
Resolution on the Aberdeen-Tupper  
Correspondence—The Commons Bar Has  
Been Shut Down for a Time—Warning  
to Filibusters—Deaths in the House.

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—(Special.)—If any  
one supposes that your Uncle, Sir Oliver  
Mowat, intends leaving the Govern-  
ment the is very much mistaken. Some  
weeks ago, at the outset of the  
formation of the Ministry, it looked as  
if his stay in Ottawa would not be  
of long duration. But as the days  
pass by over the points in the firm of  
the second partner in the firm of  
"Lawler, Mowat and Victory" is  
here to stay. This may not be very  
satisfactory news to Sir Richard  
Cartwright, but he will have to con-  
tend himself with his arrival in Ot-  
tawa. The Minister of Justice leased  
the residence of Judge Sedgewick.  
This lease terminates at the end of  
this month, and Sir Oliver has no  
made arrangements for another resi-  
dence for a period of two years from  
October 1. It is owned by Mrs. Gibbs  
and situated at 64 Cartier-street, a few  
doors from Sir Charles Tupper's new  
residence.

MAKING APPOINTMENTS.

Following out a rule of the House  
which has been in existence for many  
years, but which was allowed to fall  
into desuetude, a number of Parlia-  
mentary agents have been appointed  
mentary agents have been appointed  
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Mr. Fisher briefly outlined his policy  
in connection with the farm, paying a  
high tribute to the staff, whom he be-

thought, however, a mistake had been  
made at the outset in purchasing too

CROP BULLETIN.

On the item for crop bulletins, Mr.  
Clancy called attention to the evils  
arising from giving detailed crop re-  
ports, which were utilized for the pur-  
pose of affecting the price of grain.  
The Hon. Minister of Agriculture  
explained that the plan for the ship-  
ment of Canadian butter, which had  
fallen through, shipments during the sea-  
son by insulated cold storage depart-  
ments on steamers, however, amounted to  
twice as much as last year, and the  
prospect for the fall was very bright.  
The vote was also provided assistance  
towards cold storage cars, which had  
been in the market through the  
country.

Mr. Montague took this increase to  
be a great credit to the policy in-  
augurated and carried out by the late  
Government. He also expressed his  
admiration for the practical sugges-  
tions to the effect that if the Govern-  
ment desired to secure the British  
market for its produce, it should in-  
sist that only first-class butter be  
sent to Canada. Mr. Sproule's sugges-  
tion that the Government should ap-  
point special Canadian agents to be  
sent to the United States to control  
the business in England.

Messrs. McNeill and Montague con-  
curred in the Minister's policy. Mr.  
Agriculture declared that a system  
of inspection would be instituted, and  
that the liquor question this after-  
noon, and finally referred the matter  
to a committee, which means no action  
this session.

GENERAL NOTES.

The curious spectacle was presented  
in the House to-day of the opposition  
party being blocked by the disposi-  
tion of the Liberals to talk. The climax  
was reached when that loyal  
Conservative, Mr. Craig, appealed to  
the Government benches not to block  
the estimates.

Mr. Laurier gives notice of a resolu-  
tion that for the remainder of the ses-  
sion Government orders have pre-  
cedence on Mondays after the consid-  
eration of private bills and on Wed-  
nesdays, with an hour for consid-  
eration of private bills in the evening.

IN THE COMMONS.

Opposition Urged Pushing on the Busi-  
ness and the Liberal Bench Inclined  
to be Talkative.

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—(Special.)—The  
whole of to-day's sitting was spent in  
supply and good progress was made.  
After routine, Mr. Fielding gave notice  
that on Thursday he would ask the  
House to concur in the resolutions  
passed in Committee of Supply in or-  
der that the urgent necessities of the  
Government be met. Mr. Fielding's

THE OLIVER EQUIPMENT.

Mr. Tisdale brought up the matter of  
cancellation of the order for the pur-  
chase of the Oliver equipment. The  
order from the Toronto World of the  
14th statement that another order  
in-coming from the late Administration  
had been cancelled, namely, authorizing  
the purchase for \$5000 of this  
equipment. Col. Tisdale hoped this ac-  
tion had not been taken by the Govern-  
ment. The Oliver equipment had been  
purchased for \$5000, although it was  
evidently arisen in the meantime.  
Accordingly the item stood and the  
committee proceeded to deal with the  
public works estimates.

DOMINION REFORMATORY.

Major McLennan asked for information  
regarding work on the Dominion  
Reformatory at Alexandria.  
Mr. Tarte said a difficulty had arisen  
between the Chief Architect and  
Public Works and Contractor Bourque,  
and since then the contractor had  
done little work on the building; in-  
deed only \$2000 had been paid to him  
for what he had done. To complete  
his contract, as he had suspended op-  
eration for the present, the Govern-  
ment was considering whether it was  
a wise policy to have only one re-  
formatory in the Dominion.

Mr. McLennan said Contractor  
Bourque had quit work and had re-  
moved all his plant. Was it the in-  
tention of the Government to re-let  
the work to some other contractor?  
Mr. Tarte said Mr. Bourque had two  
years in which to complete his con-  
tract. Until it was shown that he  
could not finish the work the Depart-  
ment could not relieve him of the con-  
tract.

Dr. Sproule asked what was the es-  
timate of the work.  
Mr. Tarte said it was very much  
higher than the contract price. Mr.  
Bourque had intimated to him that  
that paper was not correct. The  
Minister's explanation was not  
regarded as satisfactory, and for the  
rest of the hour he made a running  
series of questions from Messrs. Cas-  
grain, Montague, Wood, Sproule, For-  
ster, McNeill and Mr. Tarte.  
Mr. Taylor referred to Gagnon's  
requirements in the matter of a new  
drill hall, and his contract was inter-  
rupted by a Liberal member yelling, "Car-  
ried. This led the member for Law-  
ler to remark that since the Liberals  
were over to the Government benches  
about their heads had become swollen.  
He advised these noisy gentlemen to  
repair downstairs and soak their  
heads a little. (Loud laughter.)  
The House adjourned at 12.30 a.m.

Richard Bailey of Bowmanville was

Furniture Factory this afternoon, when  
Richard Bailey, a local millwright, was  
killed by a falling log. The log was  
being lowered into the mill race, and
