THE C.P.R. IS "SPLENDID ISOLATION."

The unique feature of the railway war is the "splendid isolation" of the Canadian Pacific. That company has not a single ally among all the great railway powers of the continent. Still, it is confident in its strength and haughty in its isolation. If any American railway magnate desires to see Sir William Van Horne the latter can be found during business hours at Windsor Station, Montreal. That is Sir Van's present attitude. There he is. There he intends to stay. It is the other fellows who have to walk the floor. The redoubtable Van has inscribed on his coat of arms the motto "J'y suis; j'y reste." Van has a whole Spithamir behind him. He can afford to be haughty.

To vary the monotony Sir William is in Toronto. His enemies can amuse themselves as they please. That the Canadian Pacific Railway considers itself the master of the situation is evident from various outward manifestations. In the first place, it has forced the fighting and aroused the rival lines in combination against itself. A weak man, or a weak concern, does not generally declare war against its rivals. In the next place the C. P. R. expresses no anxiety to treat with the enemy. The latter has sent a deputation to Montreal on a mission of peace, but the deputation has received the marble heart and the icy eye. Sir William has issued his ultimatum on the question of differentials, and as soon as the transcontinental lines accept that ultimatum there will be peace—but no sooner.

unless, after paying actual deposits and other creditors current rates of interest, there should be a surplus. The whole transaction, therefore, looks as if it were designed to secure a means of carrying Mr. Kerr's real estate, and this we understand, Mr. Kerr frankly admitted.

Money Raised From Small Depositors.
This main purpose having been accomplished, the company turned to the extraction of other powers, and the result was a large amount of money raised from small depositors.

There appears to have been three years' default at least, and each of the officers has incurred a liability of not less than \$20,000.

Dr. Kerr's Explanation.
Mr. Kerr, when seen by The World reporter yesterday, said that when the sale of his real estate took place he believed that Toronto's real estate had "turned the corner," and that the liquidation would result in a handsome profit to the company, which he hoped to become on this foundation a strong financial institution. His equities were purchased at \$105,000 less than the value placed upon them by Galley and Dunstan, and a contingent and reserve fund account was opened in the books, in which this sum was credited. Against it was to be charged any possible loss that might result from the liquidation of his property. It is his intention that neither he nor any of his relatives shall make any claim on the company, until all creditors have been paid in full. Some members of his family have, he says, been heavy losers.

A Central Hotel.

Discharge Their Character.
The not least discredit of the company's history is its neglect to annually report its affairs, as required by the act of incorporation, if not by the general statute of the province. By the amended charter the company was required to send to the Provincial Secretary on or before Feb. 1 in each year a statement showing the names, residences and addresses of the directors, the amount of capital stock, the number of shares taken from the commencement of the company, stock free from call, stock subject to call, the total amount for which shareholders have made the state of the company's business.

It is the duty of the Vice-President of the company to have been the Provincial Secretary. No report has been made under this charter. Last year, on the 1st of February, the Provincial Secretary, Mr. J. Howard Hunter, the Inspector of Loan Companies, a statement was rendered which gives but limited information. From that statement, which was sworn to by Mr. Kerr on March 4, 1897, it appears that the Board of Directors was composed of Mr. Kerr, Hon. E. J. Davis, ex-M.L.A., vice-president; Robert McKinnon, John McKinnon, ex-M.L.A., David Spry, Ed. Croun and George Dunstan, secretary-treasurer.
