While preferring to deal directly with the emp'oyes engaged in the Grand Trunk service, rather than through the medium of outside organizations, the present management has never declined to receive and hear properly constituted committees representing the various classes of its employes upon matters in connection with its rules, regulations, etc. It does not decline to do so in this instance, but, having received the assurance of a large number of its agents and operators that the committee now presenting a schedule of rules and regulations which they propose should be adopted for the governance of thes e employes, does not represent them and is not authorized to speak for them, it does not appear improper to require that some definite evidence of the author'ty which they claim should be produced before proceeding to the con-sideration of the schedule of rules and regulations desired. 

SIR WILLIAM JENNER DEAD.

The Physician-in-ordinary to the Queen and Prince of Wales

Has Crossed the Har.

London, Dec. 12.—Sir William Jenner, the distinguished pathologist and physician-in-ordinary to the Queen and the Prince of Wales, died to-day.

The late Sir William Jenner, sho was president of the Hoyal College of Physicians from 1881 to 1889, when he retired from the practice of his profession, was well known not only to pathologists, but to the public at large, as having been the first no escablish beyond dispute the difference in kind between typbus and typhoid feer.

On the death of Dr. Baly, in 1861, Dr. Jenner was appointed to succeed him is physician-extraordinary to the Queen, and the next year he was gazetted physician-ordinary to the Malesty, receiving the same preferment in 1863 in the household of the Prince of Wales.

It was in recognition of his services rendered during a severe silness of the Prince of the Bath. He wrote numerous papers on fever, the acute specific diseases of the heart, lungs and skin, military Government he procusted with the utmost energy against the inaginary -[violent interruptions]-relative to the latter's daughter. [oproar and hoots.]

Austria, M. Grousset said, was next mixed up in the affair. The speaker said he pointed out these matters in order to show that a press campaign had been inaugurated by certain interested persons to prevent the discovery of the truta. M. Grousset concluded with demanding whether the Government was disposed to permit the centre of resistance to the law to pass from the Ministry of War to the general staff of the military Government of Paris; whether it would any longer tolerate this attitude of the ringleaders, and whether it would govern for the Republic or for the Jesuits. [Applause from the Extreme Leftists and vloient protests elsewhere.]

The Minister of War, M. de Freycinet, repudlated M. Grousset's allegations. He said that if there had been some indiscretion, it was unjust and imprudent to attack the whole army-unjust, because the army was excellent, devoted to its duty and incapable of the acts charged; imprudent, because it was hable to lead to a disorganization of the military institutions.

The Minister of War concluded with vigorously protesting against the accusation brought against the general staff and the military Government of Paris of resisting the law.

M. Dupy asked the Chamber to close the discussion and adopt the order of the day, which was done by a vote of 463 to 78.

The House then adjourned.
