In Toronto the tests are made, but are not published. In Toronto Junction the tests are made monthly, and inserted in the local papers. The report handed to the board to-night was that for the month of June, a month which in former years has shown a fair average, and which is generally considered a good month for milk generally considered a good month for milk and butter.
