HASTINGS, DURHAM, WELLINGTON, RHODES.

After the Jameson Raid, the British public, all forgetful of his wonderful services to the empire, heaped abuse upon the head of Cecil Rhodes, a London contemporary, commenting upon this, observes: "He had added a territory as large as India to the empire; he had worked for the best years of his life in the interests and advancement of his country; all his sterling abilities and untiring energy had been devoted to the public service, and he was treated in a manner that would have been unduly severe if he had been a mere Labourer or a Stead. Such is the generosity of the British nation, and such the premium which it places upon its service, that his one great mistake, the under-estimation of the public service, and the consequences of which he cheerfully accepted—was held to overbalance a quarter of a century fruitful in public works that could have been performed by no other living man.

A young men's club will be formed shortly, and the Conservatives of the riding are going to wage a very aggressive campaign in the fall.

THE BRITISH BREAD TAX

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach's new "bread tax" will not amount to a reimposition of the old "corn laws," against which Bright and Cobden conducted a brilliant campaign in the latter half of the century ago. It will be a return to the "registration tax," which continued to exist until 1898, when Gladstone and Love abolished it. How the new tax will compare with the old in amount may be reckoned upon the reputation of Warren Hastings, who ruined Lord Durham because he had saved Canada; which forgot the achievements of Torres Vedras and Waterloo in a moment of mean, petty spite, and battered in the windows of the Duke of Wellington's town residence at Hyde Park Corner, treated the Government as a mean, open-handed chivalry, and subsisted upon establishing for all time the hypothesis that greatness is its own and only reward. Had he lived long enough, he would, no doubt, have climbed into the saddle again; for the same fecklessness which prompts the nation to inflict sundry and severe penalties for blunders, and to persevere long and conscientiously, would have easily given way before the firm fixity of purpose that was one of Mr. Rhodes' chief characteristics.

SUPERIORITY OF CANADIAN FLOUR

According to the latest bulletin issued by the Canadian Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, Canadian flour of the best sort outclasses competitors in England. In trials recently made, our better flour shows about one-tenth more of albuminoids than the best quality of Hungarian flour, and the albuminoids, or gluten, being more tenacious, yield a dough which rises and holds its position better in the baked loaf. According to the experiments carried on, the percentages of albuminoids, or protein, the most important part from a nutritive standpoint were: Canadian, best patent, 12.50 per cent; Hungarian, best grade, 11.27 per cent. The determination of gluten, both wet and dry, was also in favor of Canadian flour, namely: Canadian, best patent, wet gluten 34.22, dry gluten 12.33; Hungarian, best grade, wet gluten 31.50, dry gluten 11.50.

Imperialism in Canada

From Fall Mail Gazette of 24th March, 1902. Canada has now made the first denture and official parliamentary step towards proposing a practical basis for annexation of the Dominion into every part of the world where the British flag is to be found. I made a special trip to Ottawa to hear the speech of my friend the member for Ontario, Mr. William F. Mackenzie, while addressing himself to the relations between Canada and the Empire. Mr. Mackenzie said: "The Prime Minister (Sir Wilfrid Laurier) this afternoon referred to the fact that the Empire is a way that was not satisfactory to me, nor I think to the people of this country. All I need to say was that he had allowed the Empire to be a thing to be made. I would have liked to see Canada pay for that contingent and send it as a gift and as our contribution to the Empire. I totally disagree with the hon. gentleman on the other side who think they have discharged their whole duty to the Empire in giving England a trade preference. A trade preference is a mere contribution to the Empire; but not the manufacturers and workmen of England, and the workmen of Germany who come in by way of England, and at the expense of Canadian workmen. The only thing which England has been passing thru which has brought the Empire together. People everywhere are looking forward to some new kind of Imperial policy, which will be a fair policy in favor of the workmen and capitalists of the United States. That policy which has built up 'Coca-Cola' to all, and it is the people of Canada who have led the way in showing that the people of the world are not content with a national policy were sufficient, not only for their own prosperity, but also for the prosperity of the whole Empire.

UNPROMISING SITUATION

Montreal, April 16.—St. Lawrence Bridge promoters, who came from Ottawa to-day, say the situation is very unpromising both as regards bridge and tunnel charters between the city and the south shore. Both the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific are strenuously opposing such a project, and it is claimed they have a solid majority against even the government can influence. The St. Lawrence Bridge Company's charter, issued by Mr. Mackenzie, M.P., was to have come up for its third reading yesterday, but was postponed indefinitely, and the impression is that no charter will be granted this session.

OWEN SOUND NEWS

Owen Sound, April 16.—The death of Samuel Egerton, ex-Chief of Police, occurred this morning, after a short illness. Deceased was 82 years of age, and was for a number of years chief constable, having previously served on the Metropolitan Police of London, England, from which he retired with a pension. The steamer City of Collingwood left this morning with a large quantity of freight and a full list of passengers on her first trip. The local politicians are hard at work preparing for the elections. Committee-rooms are being fitted up, and meetings throughout the riding advertised on behalf of A. G. McKay, the Liberal, and G. M. Boyd, the Conservative candidate. Mulholland, the first rector of the Anglican Church here, is seriously ill, and, at his advanced age, recovery is hardly hoped for. The schedule of the Northern Navigation Company's boats has been changed. The Collingwood, Germanic and Midland will sail, respectively, on Monday, Thursday and Saturday, for the present, and the Atlantic will remain on the Parry Sound route. The steamer City of Collingwood will take the place of the Dixon of the Booth Line, from here to Manitowish, Ill., on the 21st inst. Balm Beach Hotel is ready for roofing, and the contractor expects to have it completed early in May. The name King Edward has been chosen for the new hotel, which will accommodate 200 guests.

Rehearsals have been conducted at the Lyric Theatre, and everything ready for the opening performance to-night. A special feature will be the mandolin, guitar and banjo selections by students of the College of Music and University College. The stage of the Hall has been greatly enlarged, to accommodate the scenery which is equal to any scenery in Toronto.
