Harland & Wolff, of Belfast, alone built 81,316 tons, which beats all re-cords and is five times the amount which all the British dockyards have added to the navy. On the Clyde 420,-841 tons were launched, which is an increase of 60,689 over the year 1895. It is said that not a single ship building yard abroad approaches any of

the leading British firms. FIREDAMP EXPLOSION. London, Dec. 21.-An explosion of firedamp occurred yesterday in a coal mine at Resicesa, in the yalley of Tems, Hungary. A large number of men were at work in the mine, and 40 of them were killed outright. Rescuing parties entered the mine as soon as possible after the explosion, and succeeded in taking out eighteen men, who were seriously injured. It is known that 27 miners are still entombed, but whether they are alive or not is uncertain. Efforts to reach the part of the mine in which they were




A Young Farmer Who Periodically Falls Arleep at Work and Can't Be Froused.
