WEEKLY.

The deliveries of grain were poor this week, owing mostly to bad roads and stormy weather. In looking over today's values, and comparing them with those ruling a week ago, we find the only changes in grain are in oats and wheat. Both of these lines were lower during the week than at closing, but have not fully recovered the amount lost.

In butter and eggs we see little change, 11c to 12c being the ruling wholesale price for the latter, and 17c to 18c for pound rolls. Butter, in baskets and retail, has sold to private parties, have in some cases brought in over these prices, but it only occurred occasionally.

Chickens, ducks and turkeys have been very scarce, and sold at quite fancy prices. Potatoes sold at 5c to 9c by the load, and 9c to 11c by the bag. Meats were steady; the supply was good. Hides and skins show no alterations. Hay went up, kiting as in the week, and has remained steady at the advance. Closing values were 35 to 39 per ton.
