INDUCTED AS PASTOR OF HAMILTON ROAD CHURCH LAST NIGHT

Rev. J. R. Laverie Takes Over New Charge.

RECEPTION IS HELD

Members of Church Greet the New Minister and Family.

Rev. J. R. Laverie was inducted into the pastorate of Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church Tuesday evening, and a hearty reception was tendered Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Laverie at the close of the service.

Rev. S. H. Eastman, moderator, of Port Stanley, presided. Rev. H. E. Thornloe, St. Thomas, preached the sermon, taking for his text the words "How much better is a man than sheep?"

W. W. Knox of the First Presbyterian Church addressed the preacher. "The Gift of Prophecy" was the subject of this address, and it was pointed out that a preacher is a prophet, inasmuch as he presents God to the people in his discourses.

Rev. D. McKay of Dorchester, in a brief address to the congregation, outlined the work that a church should undertake in a community. Rev. Dr. D. L. McCrae gave an account of the steps leading up to the call which was extended to Rev. J. R. Laverie. Revs. James McKay, J. G. Stuart and W. M. Martin were present as members of the London Presbytery.

Rev. J. R. Laverie, who is a Scotchman by birth, was educated at McGill University, having come to Canada in early life. This is the third charge that Rev. Mr. Laverie has held during his ministry. He was in the Ottawa Presbytery at Ramothville, and in Killarney in Owen Sound Presbytery before moving to Forest. It was exactly five years ago Tuesday evening since Rev. Mr. Laverie was inducted into the pastorate at Port Stanley.

The members of the congregation express the opinion that his ministry here will be a successful one.

Mrs. Laverie and two little daughters, Hope and Lois, were present at the reception. They will return to Forest today to enable the girls to complete the school term there.

LOCAL BARRISTERS WIN A SENSATIONAL CASE AT KINGSTON

J. M. McEvoy and U. A. Buchner Victors in Will Case.

KINGSTON, May 21.—J. M. McEvoy and U. A. Buchner of London won out in a sensational case which came before Chief Justice R. M. Meredith at the non-jury sittings of the supreme court.

They appeared on behalf of Mrs. Mary Ann Gallagher of Monaca, California, plaintiff, in a suit against George Woodman, coal and wood merchant in the village of Wolfe Island near this city. The plaintiff's claim was for a declaration that the will of her late husband, Robert Smith, who died on Wolfe Island in December, 1912, was void, having been made under duress and undue influence, and to have defendant declared a trustee of the property for the next of kin of the said deceased.

K. C. Kingston appeared for the defendant. Judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiff with costs following the judgment. Application was made for administration.

By the will of the deceased Woodman the defendant was left \$5,000, while his sister, the only blood relation living, was cut off with \$1,000.

Lived Alone. Smith lived alone and suffered from duress of the stomach. Woodman, a neighbor, helped him with his business as a farmer. His lordship stated that the will was not the last will and testament of Robert Smith. The evidence, he said, did not give him an opportunity to satisfy his conscience that it was the last will of the deceased. The evidence shown was that the will was in a dying condition for seven days, and he had not even been attended by a nurse. He had been confined to his bed with his clothing on all the while, and in his summing up his lordship referred to this as "inhuman treatment."

Son is Witness. The witness to the will was one of Woodman's sons. His lordship pointed out that everything pertaining to the will had been kept in Woodman's family. His lordship stated that the will was not that of Robert Smith, but rather that of the will of defendant.

The appeal in the case of Sister Basil vs. Archbishop Spott will be heard in Toronto next week before five judges. The case was delayed, owing to the fact that W. N. Tilley, chief counsel for Sister Basil, has been engaged with the C. N. R. case.

OBJECTORS' TRIAL BY COURT-MARTIAL HAS BEEN ADJOURNED

Men Will Face Military Court Later for Refusal.

Two courts-martial scheduled for Tuesday at Wolseley Barracks were adjourned until further notice, after the court had convened at 10 a.m., with Lieut.-Col. W. J. Douglas as president, and Major E. Nelles and Capt. Bell as members.

The accused are two conscientious objectors, Pte. Edward McCracken and Pte. Samuel J. Steele, both of the 1st Battalion, No. 6. They are charged with "Disobeying a lawful command given by a superior officer." The men refused to put on the khaki.

When court meets again, Major G. N. Weeks, district intelligence officer, will act as judge advocate, and Capt. William Lewis, Canadian Garrison Regiment, will act as prosecutor.

It is stated that one of the accused is a member of the Plymouth Brethren, and the other a Christianadelphian. Two other conscientious objectors tried by court-martial here, were recently sentenced to serve two years in prison for refusing to do the khaki.

MORAL "CLEAN UP" IN ST. THOMAS TO RESULT

Sordid Story of 15-Year-Old Girl Brings It About.

ST. THOMAS, May 21.—The arrest last evening of a fifteen-year-old girl, daughter of a soldier who is now at sea, has "started something" here, and before this investigation now in progress is completed, it is believed that a moral "clean up" will result.

Pending developments in the case, at her examination before the local magistrate today, a shocking condition of affairs was disclosed.

The girl, who is named, gave her own mother, or having improper relations with a prominent railroad, and gave this as an excuse why she committed a similar offence at the instigation of the wife of a soldier, from her home last Friday ran away overseas.

The W. O. R. declared, were undesirable associates and dangerous to soldiers. Some of the women, it is alleged, had arranged to take the child to Detroit, for immoral purposes, and arrested. Warrants have been issued, and a wholesale clean-up will be made, it is stated.

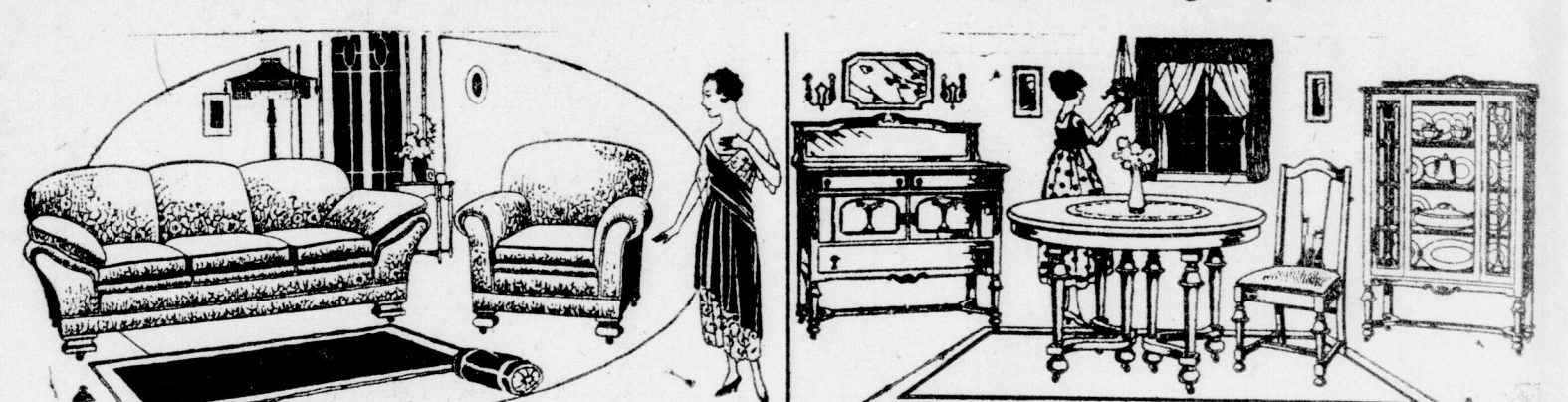
