Weather Eased Up and Consumption Has Dropped.

General-Manager Buchanan of the utilities commission proudly pointed to London's water record for the tremenlous and unprecedented hot spell through which the city has just passed. He said that his attention has been called to the fact that practically every other city in Western Ontario has had other city in Western Ontario has had water trouble this summer. St. Thomas is the latest. London has escaped entirely. There were times when the consumption of water more than equalled the city's pumping capacity. This meant that the water in the reservoir took a drop. However, it never got below 12.2 feet, and at the present time there is 14 feet in the reservoir. This is but two feet short of capacity. Since the hot spell eased up there has also been a letup in the consumption. During the real hot days over 6.000,000 gallons were consumed daily. Today the consumption is a little over five and a half millions. On Sunday the Horton street pump house pumped 1,960,000 gallons and Springbank 3,560,000 gallons.


