WAR DECLARED BY GREAT BRITAIN SIX YEARS AGO TODAY

Memories of Stirring Times Come To Whole Empire On Anniversary.

Six years ago today at midnight Great Britain, following the example set by France, declared war on Germany, and the great struggle which lasted for over four years, was begun. Six years ago tonight local patriots in the thousands, including scores of British reservists and local youths who have since made the supreme sacrifice in the front line, paraded the main streets here when patriotism throughout the British Empire was at fever heat. Several brass bends and members of the militia of this city also took part in the demonstrations, and within a few days recruiting for the First Canadian contingent was begun.

Following the declaration of war, nightly parades were a feature for London, the lads in khaki being cheered, as they marched along, by many citizens who later took part in the titanic struggle; in fact, many young boys wearing short trousers, who followed the parades of the ist Contingent Volunteers here, before peace was declared themselves signed up and proceeded overseas to join those whom they envied in 1914, and unfortunately many of them have never returned from the fight. Thousands of other Londoners have come back safely after great work at the front.

To many Londoners the realization that six years have passed is difficult, their memory fresh with early wartime scenes here. But all over the world those whose homes have been bereft of a son or brother or both, six years ago today at midnight brought back happy memories of the peaceful days preceding the great war.




